

# Drews Ave project has street appeal

A plan to install a transformative streetscape in Drews Avenue is gaining impetus after a second co-design workshop was held with key stakeholders last month.

Whanganui District Council's Town Centre Regeneration project manager, Ellen Young, says the February workshop (pictured) refined and consolidated the proposed design. Later this month the wider community will be asked for their feedback on the project.

Ellen Young says the Drews Avenue group - which includes residents, business owners, community groups and iwi representatives – has worked together to create an exciting vision for a welcoming destination. "Our aim is to develop an area with outdoor seating, greenery and games where locals can mingle and visitors can experience Whanganui's creativity and hospitality."

After the March community consultation, designer Ben Mitchell-Anyon from Patchwork Architecture will integrate the feedback into a detailed design. The semi-permanent infrastructure will be installed by the end of June, with a street opening celebration planned to tie in with this year's Lights on Bikes event.



Further community input on the changes to Drews Avenue will then be collected until May 2022, which will ultimately inform decisions about whether the alterations are made permanent, modified or removed.

Ninety percent of the project funding comes from central government, through Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency's Innovating Streets fund. The fund supports councils around the country to trial temporary changes to streets to make them more people-friendly.

## Kowhai Park road upgrades Sculpture to seal the deal

Several sections of the road through Kowhai Park will be upgraded during March. Whanganui District Council parks officer, Claire Lilley, says the main focus of the work is the resurfacing of the roadway alongside Whanganui River.

The entrance to the park's playground area will also be widened and resurfaced to provide a safer approach for users. "For this to be done a beech tree on the left-hand side of the entranceway facing the playground will need to be removed. The roots from this tree are above ground, which means that any resurfacing work would probably cause damage to the tree."

Claire Lilley says the tree is also showing signs of decline so the decision has been made to remove it. Once the roading has been finished this area will be replanted.

The work is due to begin in mid-March and will take about a week to complete.

#### Rabbit control

#### **Operations at two sites from 15 March**

Whanganui District Council contractors will conduct rabbit control operations at **Heads** Road Cemetery and Bason Botanic Gardens for two weeks starting from Monday, 15 March 2021.

The control operation at Heads Road Cemetery is required because rabbits are undermining graves and headstones with their burrowing. Rabbit control is also needed at Bason Botanic Gardens to reduce damage to lawns and planted areas. The operations will take place at night between 10.00pm and dawn the next morning to minimise any disruption to nearby residents and

The entrances to Heads Road Cemetery and Bason Botanic Gardens will be staffed during the control operations to ensure no one enters the sites. Signs will be in place during this time advising the areas are closed.

Whanganui Police have been required to approve these operations due to the use of firearms in an urban and peri-urban area. Thermal imaging equipment will be used and firearms will use .22 caliber segmented bullets and be fitted with silencers.
