

Paper4trees project is branching out

Whanganui children and young people are making a huge contribution to our local environment by participating in the nationwide Paper4trees



waste minimisation and tree planting programme.

The Paper4trees programme in Whanganui is co-funded by Whanganui District Council's Waste Minimisation Fund and promoted by the Environmental Education for Resource Sustainability Trust. Acting as an incentive to divert as much paper and cardboard from landfill as possible, Paper4trees provides all participating schools with one free native tree or plant for every two cubic metres of paper and cardboard they recycle.

The council's waste advisor, Stuart Hylton, says, "The scheme encourages preschools and schools to recycle their paper and cardboard by providing free 30-litre classroom recycling bins for every room that creates paper and cardboard waste. The council then collects and recycles all the material from participating schools.

"Fifty Whanganui schools and preschools registered for Paper4trees during the 2019-2020 period. Over this time they recycled 124 tonnes of paper and cardboard, saving 994 cubic metres of landfill space and reducing the amount of CO_2 from being produced in landfill by 671 tonnes."

Work due to begin soon on Westway pipe bridge project

Whanganui District Council's infrastructure team is working through a consent exemption process for the upcoming Westway pipe bridge project. Steel materials are being ordered with piling work planned to begin in December. This work will allow concrete work to cure over the Christmas-New Year period. All structural work will be carried out during January-February 2022.

The Westway pipe bridge services the sewer main that takes the bulk of wastewater from Durie Hill. The bridge and pipeline (pictured) are more than 100 years old and the pipe, which forms a large portion of the bridge structure, is corroded. This project is funded from central government's Three Waters Stimulus Project funding that was launched in July 2020 following last year's COVID-19 lockdowns. Raupo St road closure

Service upgrades begin 1 November

Raupo Street from Heads Road to Hinau Street will be closed to all traffic from Monday, 1 November 2021 for Whanganui District Council contractors to undertake stormwater and wastewater upgrades. This work is scheduled to take about six months.

During the upgrade all traffic in this part of Raupo Street will be diverted into Hinau Street so that vehicle users can access Rogers Street or Mosston Road as alternate routes to avoid the work area. Traffic in Heads Road will be reduced to one lane with traffic light controls while work takes place at the intersection of Heads Road and Raupo Street. Please note that affected Raupo Street residents will have access to their properties at all times during this work.
