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# A bird's-eye view of Virginia Lake


If you've ever wanted to know about the birdlife at Rotokawau Virginia Lake, a series of new signs will help. The 12 signs have been placed at easily accessible locations

around the lake. Each one has a painting and information about a different water bird that can be found at the lake. The signs are a collaboration between local artist Des

Bovey, who created the illustrations, and bird expert Peter Frost, who wrote the text. Their time was donated.

Whanganui District Council's senior parks manager, Wendy Bainbridge, says the two approached her with the drawings and text already completed. "The drawings are very beautiful and the text very informative. I hope these signs help to bring understanding to the birdlife at Rotokawau Virginia Lake. They are another reason for people to walk around and enjoy the lake."

The council funded the signs and their installation at the lake. The Virginia Lake Trust has funded a brochure of the signs, which is available at the Funky Duck Cafe at Rotokawau Virginia Lake and the Whanganui i-SITE Visitor Information Centre at 31 Taupo Quay.

# Digital literacy programmes for seniors to start at library

Whanganui District Library in partnership with the Digital Inclusion Alliance of Aotearoa is beginning FREE digital literacy programmes in March for people aged 65 and over.

The Better Digital Futures for Seniors programme is designed for over-65s who have very little experience with the internet and digital technology. The programme is divided into four different classes, or pathways, that are each designed to give older people the skills and confidence they need to go online with smartphones, tablets and-or desktop computers.

The first class on offer - the Digital Introductory Pathway starts on Friday, 19 March 2021 at the Alexander Heritage & Research Library Te Rerenga Mai o Te Kāuru, Pukenamu Queen's Park, and runs from 10.00am-12 noon over four successive weekly sessions.



At the Digital Introductory Pathway, seniors can learn about the different types of digital devices available and the various ways of communicating with people using the internet such as messaging, Skype and Zoom. Other topics of discussion will include, for example, how to use the internet to pursue hobbies as well as apps and websites that will make over-65s more independent in finding products and services online.

#### Road works on Putiki Dr / Anzac Pde

Whanganui City Bridge will be **closed** overnight from 6.00pm until 6.00am until this Sunday, 7 March 2021 for repairs to a section of Putiki Drive-Anzac Parade. The bridge will be closed to vehicles to allow for the control of traffic through the worksite (please note the pathways on the bridge will remain open to pedestrians, cyclists and mobility-scooter users). The affected Putiki Drive-Anzac Parade area will have traffic management in place

This section of road at the intersection with the City Bridge is part of State Highway 4 and the work is being carried out by Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency contractors. The repairs are weather dependent - if work is postponed it will move to the next fine night.
