Significance of decision – In terms of the Significance and Engagement Policy 2018, the recommended decision is not significant.

Recommendation

That the Policy and Bylaw Committee:

- (a) Adopts all decisions made during the deliberations and that they be incorporated into a final amended proposed Freedom Camping Bylaw 2021.
- (b) Recommends that Council confirm that:
 - (i) a bylaw is the most appropriate way of addressing the issues relating to the management of freedom camping for the purposes of protecting areas, protecting access to those areas, and/or protecting the health and safety of visitors to those areas; and
 - (ii) the Freedom Camping Bylaw 2021 is the most appropriate form of a bylaw; and
 - (iii) the Freedom Camping Bylaw 2021 is not inconsistent with the New Zealand Bill of Rights Act 1990.
- (c) Recommends that Council adopt the amended proposed Freedom Camping Bylaw 2021 with a commencement date of 1 November 2021.

Executive summary

The purpose of this report is for the Committee to hear and consider submissions and make recommendations on the proposed Freedom Camping Bylaw 2021.

Background

Under s11 of the Freedom Camping Act 2011, a local authority may put in place a bylaw regulating the practice of freedom camping within their district. A bylaw may only be made if the local authority considers that doing so is necessary to protect an area, protect the health and safety of visitors to the area, or to protect access to the area. A bylaw must also be the most appropriate and proportionate way of addressing the perceived problems, and must not be inconsistent with the New Zealand Bill of Rights Act 1990.

This proposed bylaw was brought before the Strategy and Finance Committee on 29 June, and was accepted for consultation at that meeting. A copy of the [Statement of Proposal for the Proposed Freedom Camping Bylaw](#) is available on the Council website. A list of submitters who elected to speak in support of their submission (**Ref 1**) and a copy of [all submissions](#) is available on the Council website. An analysis of all submissions, with a summary of each submission including officer recommendations is attached (**Ref 3**).

Summary of consultation process

The consultation on the proposed Freedom Camping Bylaw began Monday 12 July, running until Sunday 5 September, and was publicly notified as follows:

- Community Link;
- Council Facebook; and
- Have Your Say.

Individual notices were sent out to the Hapū collectives Tūpoho and Tamaūpoko, the commercial campgrounds operating within the Whanganui District, Fire and Emergency New Zealand, the New Zealand Motor Caravan Association, Responsible Campers Association Incorporated, Progress Castlecliff, and the Whanganui Board Riders Association.

Submissions

A total of 150 were received, with 14 submitters wanting to present their submissions to Council.

Summary of submissions to the proposed Freedom Camping Bylaw

Consultation topic 1 – Freedom Camping Bylaw

Currently, there are no enforceable controls on the activity of freedom camping. This topic was asking people whether they supported introducing a bylaw that would be able to regulate freedom camping as an activity.

This question received the most responses, with the vast majority of submitters being in favour of it.

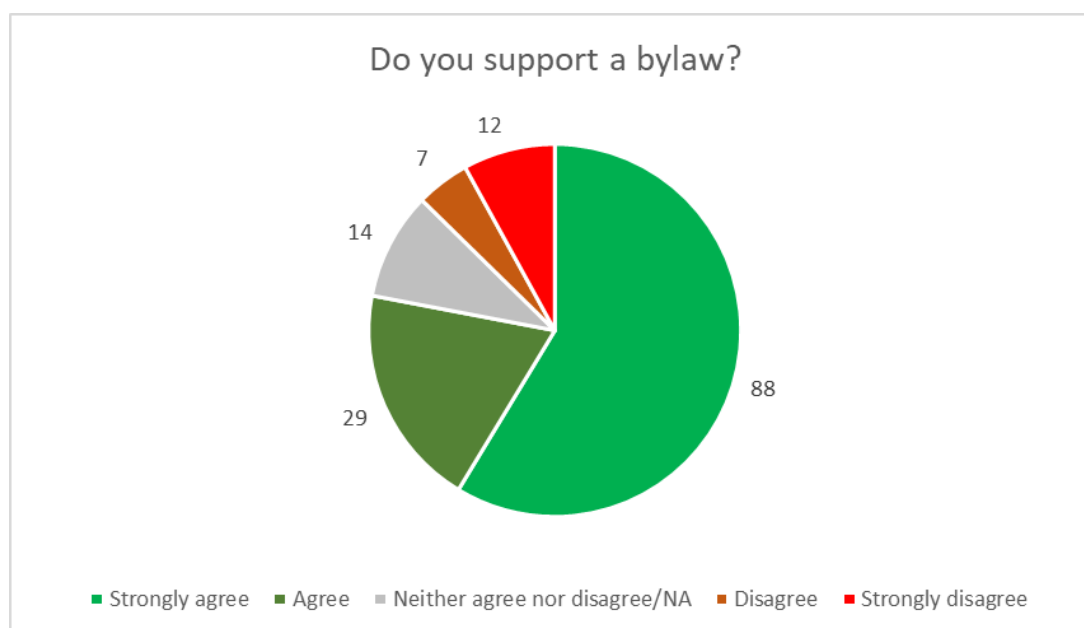


Chart 1 – Do you support the bylaw?

117 submitters either agreed or strongly agreed with the proposal to introduce a bylaw controlling freedom camping, with 19 either disagreeing or strongly disagreeing, and another 14 neither agreeing nor disagreeing, or not commenting.

The most common reasons for supporting a bylaw were concerns about long stays, followed by economic complaints – these were largely around the use of ratepayer-funded services by people who did not pay rates.

There needs to be better controls over where people are staying and for how long

Sub 005

I am seeing too many people in large buses actually living on public sites... they are not freedom camping they are freedom living.

Sub 016

Whanganui need to introduce a Freedom Camping Bylaw to control the people taking advantage and overstaying.

Sub 059

Those who opposed the proposed Bylaw mostly felt that it was unnecessary or unhelpful.

If a vehicle is registered and warranted and it is certified for self containment then in my view it may park up anywhere for as long as it's allowed to be there and provided the occupants are respectful of the environment

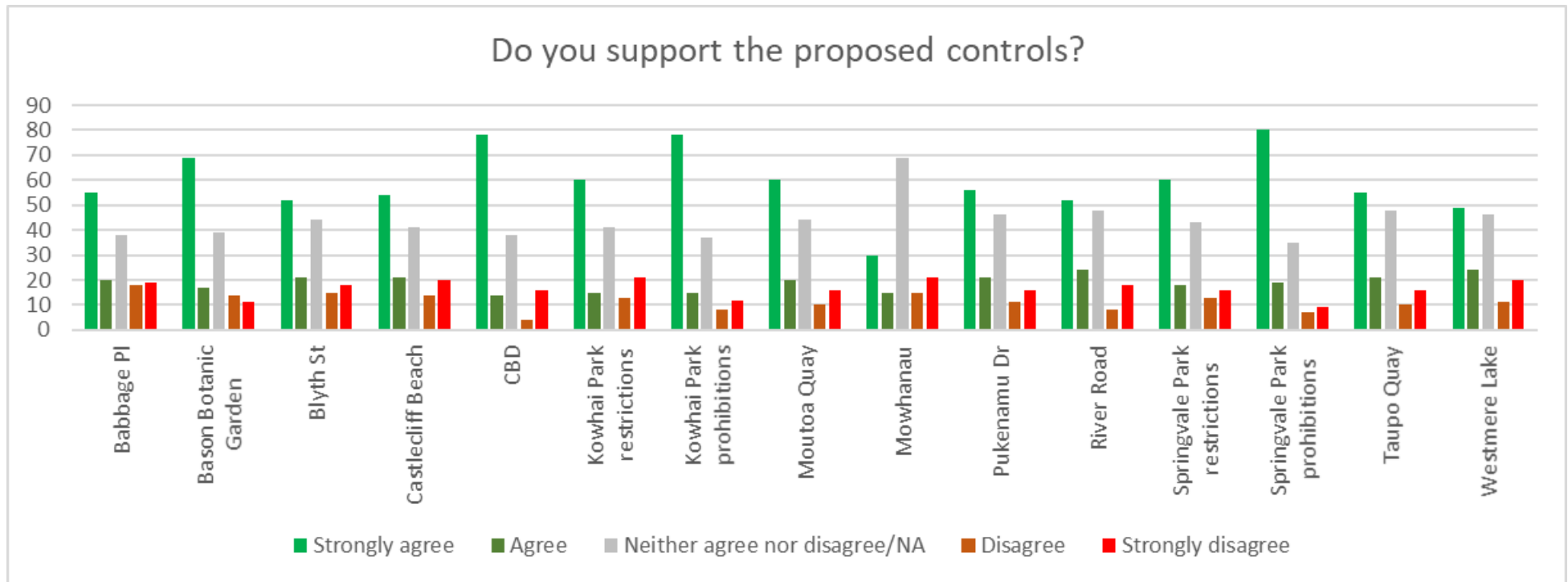
Having individual bylaws around the country causes confusion for everyone, no matter how hard you try and educate people. Areas like The Far North have proved you don't need a bylaw to manage overcrowding and undesirable behavior.

Sub 078

In almost every case, the majority of submitters supported the proposed restrictions, with the exception of Mowhanau. This is explained by the fact that the question on this area had been inadvertently left out of the questionnaire. Data was still gathered where possible, however –each of the first 50 submitters was contacted, provided them the question and invited them to answer, and their responses were included as part of their overall submission. Some submitters also independently commented on Mowhanau in the “general comments” section of their submission.

Proposed Controls

Proposed controls and prohibitions related to 15 locations across the district, each of which was treated as a distinct topic across the submission form.

Consultation topic 2 – Controls on Babbage Place

The controls proposed for Babbage Place were:

- A limit of 2 nights freedom camping per calendar month;
- A maximum of 4 vehicles freedom camping at any one time;
- Self-contained vehicles only;
- Freedom camping may only occur between 7pm and 10am; and
- Freedom campers may not spread out around their vehicles.

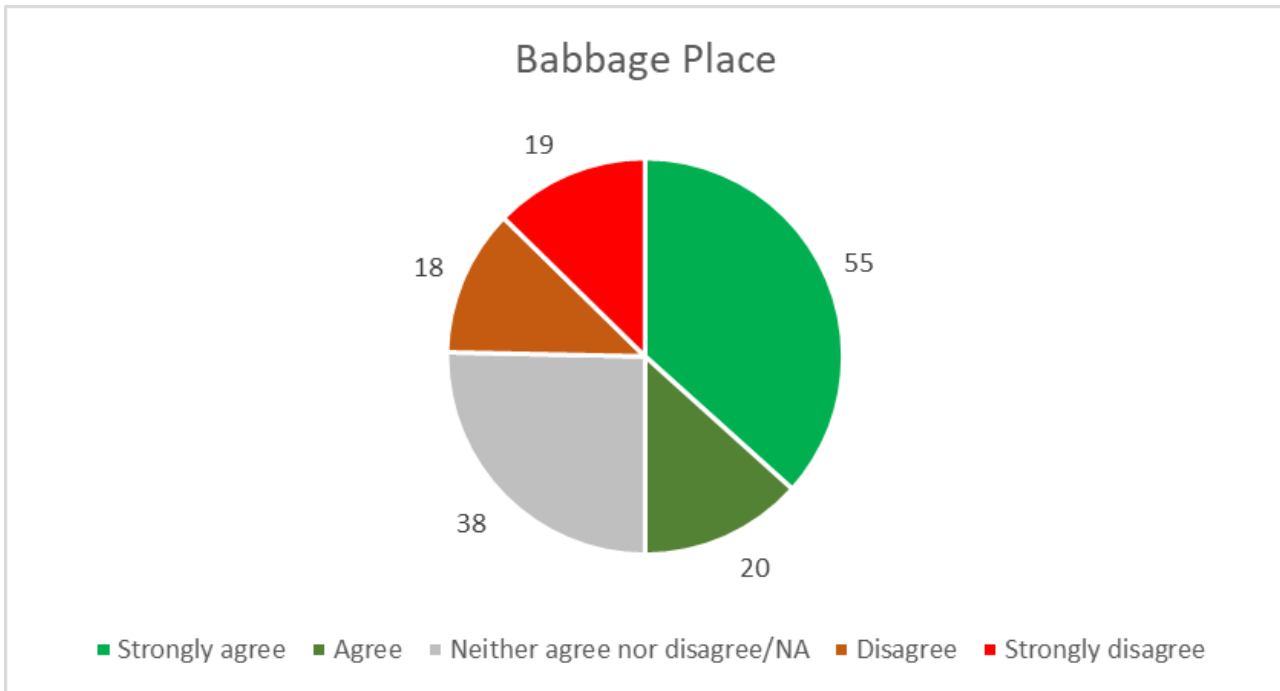


Chart 3 – Proposed Controls on Babbage Place

In total, 75 submitters either agreed or strongly agreed with the proposed controls, compared to 37 who disagreed or strongly disagreed, and 38 who neither agreed nor disagreed, or did not answer the question. The primary concern was about campers who stayed in one place for too long.

to stop campers staying too long

Sub 014

A suggestion made by all groups of submitters was that they would like to see the hour restrictions reworked.

It seems that the 7pm timeslot may be late in the evening. Suggest 5pm even though this may be during 'social' hours around Babbage Place.

Sub 033

Consultation topic 3 – Prohibition on Bason Botanic Garden

This area was proposed to be prohibited for freedom camping. This is to preserve the natural environment and the parking for visitors, and partly to protect the safety of campers as the gates are closed at night.

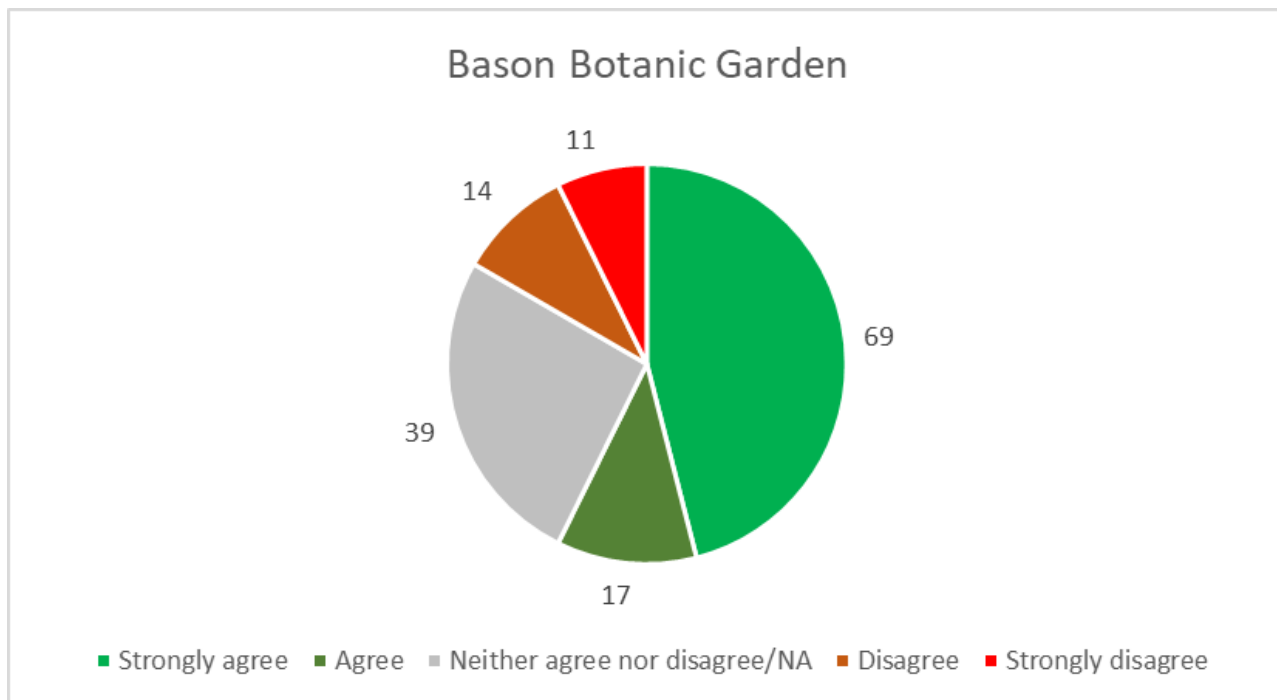


Chart 4 – Proposed Prohibition on Bason Botanic Garden

86 people either agreed or strongly agreed with the proposed restrictions for Bason Botanic Garden, compared with 39 who neither agreed nor disagreed or did not answer, and 25 who disagreed or strongly disagreed. Most submitters who agreed with the ban wanted to protect the gardens from damage resulting from camping, overcrowding, or the vandalism that might result from leaving the gates open.

If camping is permitted 24 hr access would be required resulting in vandalism Sub 040

This park is a jewel in our crown, a peaceful beautiful area for all to enjoy during the day.

Sub 049

Several people suggested allowing camping at Bason Botanic Garden subject to certain rules, but with no consistent thread.

Again. Max stay 2 days self-contained coin donation to reserve Sub 085

I am not sure if there are any parking areas here but 1 night stay for self-contained units would be good. Sub 020

Consultation topic 4 – Controls on Blyth Street

The following controls were proposed for Blyth Street:

- A limit of 2 nights freedom camping per calendar month;
- A maximum of 4 vehicles freedom camping at any one time;
- Freedom camping may only occur between 7pm and 10am; and
- Freedom campers may not spread out around their vehicles.

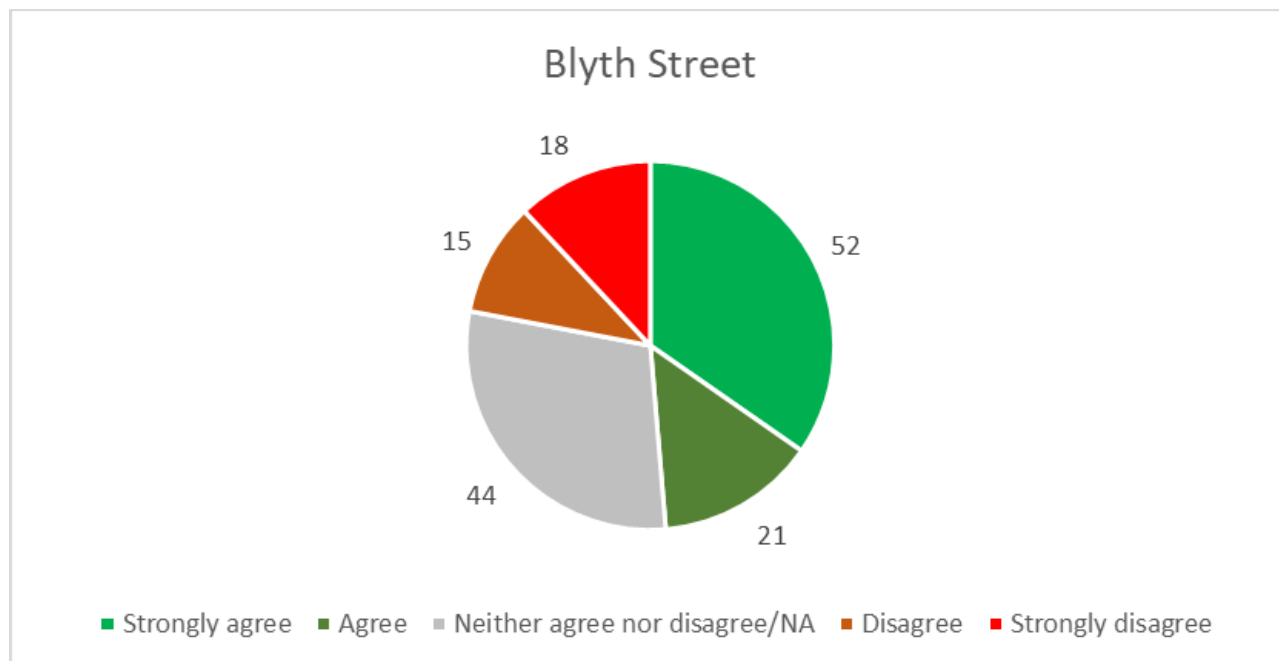


Chart 5 – Proposed Controls on Blyth Street

73 people either agreed or strongly agreed with the proposed restrictions, compared with 44 who neither agreed nor disagreed or did not answer, and 33 who disagreed or strongly disagreed. Supporters felt that, as the area is a residential area, the restrictions were necessary.

It's a residential area not a camp site.

Sub 028

Not suitable for freedom camping as impact on surrounding houses too high.

Sub 054

The most common suggestions in comments were from people who would prefer to extend the nights allowed, and those who would prefer to prohibit freedom camping in this area.

There should be no camping here at all

Sub 101

This is a residential area and camping should be prohibited.

Sub 111

Consultation topic 5 – Controls on Castlecliff Beach

The controls proposed for Castlecliff Beach were:

- A limit of 2 nights freedom camping per calendar month; and
- A maximum of 10 vehicles freedom camping between the upper and middle carparks at any one time.

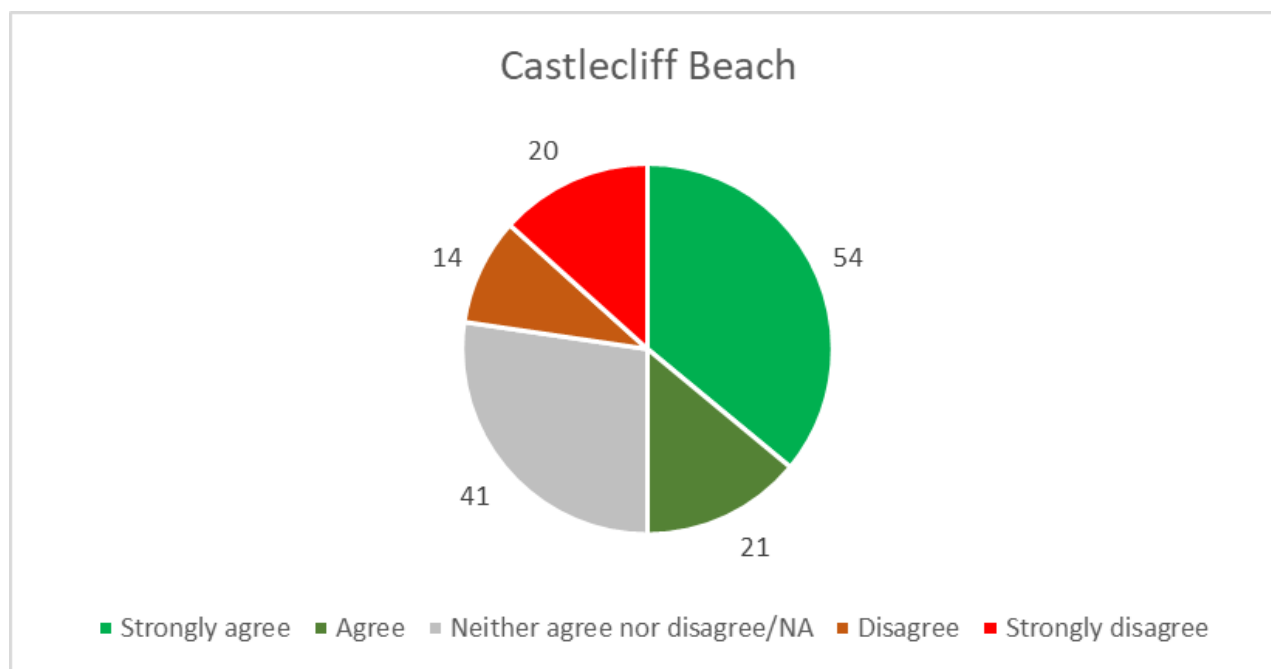


Chart 6 – Proposed Controls on Castlecliff Beach

75 submitters agreed or strongly agreed with the proposals for Castlecliff Beach, followed by 41 who neither agreed nor disagreed or didn't answer, and 34 who either disagreed or strongly disagreed. The most common reason for supporting the proposed restrictions was to support the local campsites.

There is a commercial operation nearby and it is unfair to them. *Sub 119*

There is a proper camping ground in castlecliff if they wish to stay longer. *Sub 125*

Among those who disagreed, the most common reason was because they would have preferred freedom camping to be prohibited in this area.

I think Freedom camping in this area should be prohibited. Camping grounds in Whangnau are missing out on business as a result of Freedom Camping. *Sub 021*

Consultation topic 6 – Prohibition on the Central Business District

Freedom camping was proposed to be prohibited in the Central Business District, defined as the area bordered by St Hill Street, Dublin Street, Wicksteed Street, Cameron Terrace, Bell Street, Market Place, and Taupo Quay.

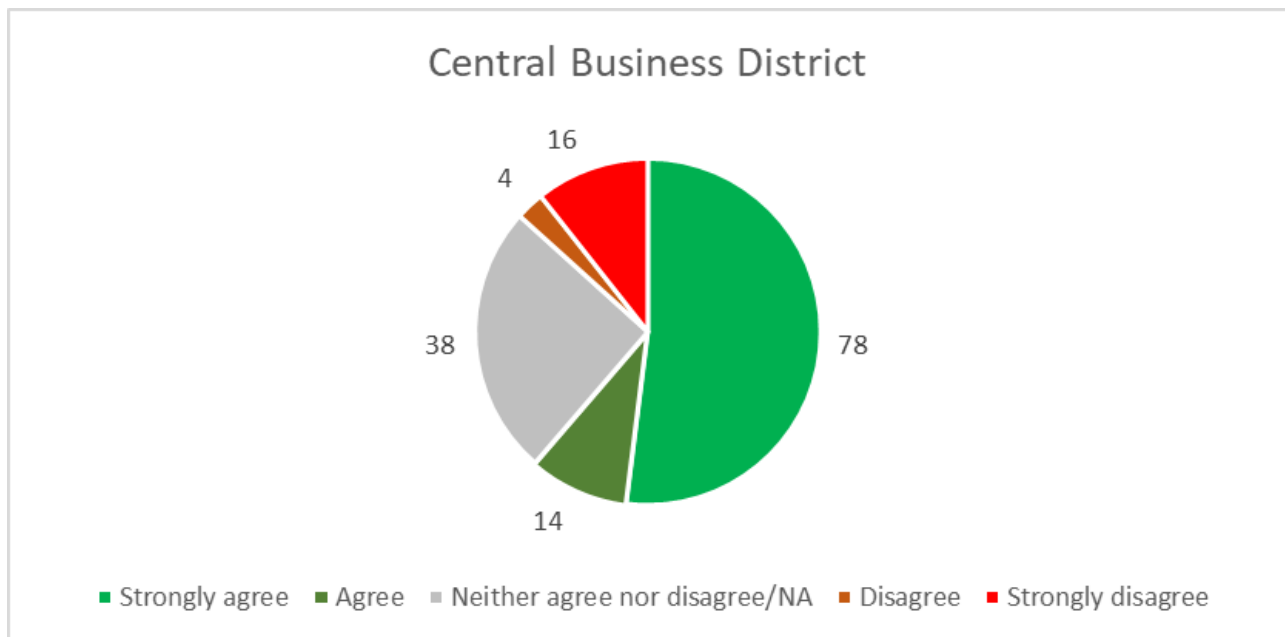


Chart 7 – Proposed Prohibition for Central Business District

92 submitters agreed or strongly agreed with the proposed prohibition, compared with 20 who either disagreed or strongly disagreed, and 38 who neither agreed nor disagreed or did not answer. Most supporters felt freedom camping should be restricted in order to make sure parking was still accessible.

I think it's sensible to prohibit freedom camping in the CBD, so the business owners & staff are able to park during their working days & move more freely. Sub 065

Yes This is the Central-ish part of Whanganui. Campers Being there will take up to much space. Sub 105

Consultation topic 7 – Controls on Kowhai Park

The following restrictions were proposed for the area between the boat ramp and the Anzac Parade toilets.

- A limit of 2 nights freedom camping per calendar month; and
- A maximum of 10 vehicles freedom camping at any one time.

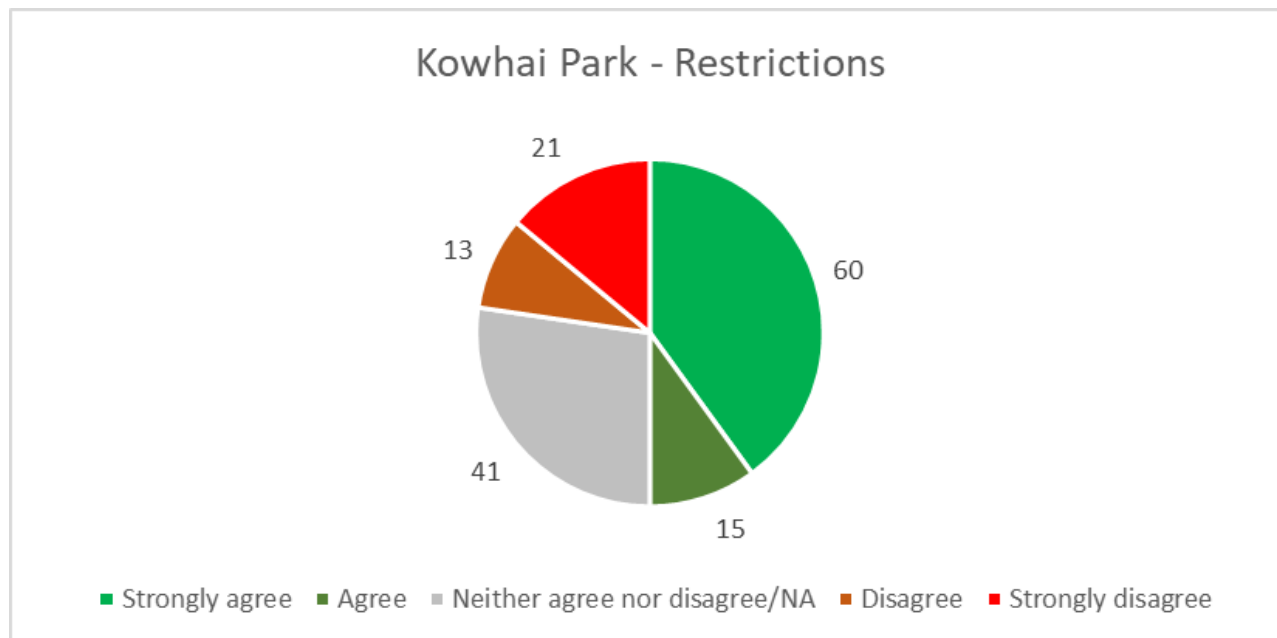


Chart 8 – Proposed Restrictions for Kowhai Park

A total of 75 people either agreed or strongly agreed with the proposed restrictions, compared to 34 who disagreed or strongly disagreed, and 41 who neither agreed nor disagreed or did not answer. Most supporters were concerned about long stays in the area.

This is an ideal place for camping for a couple of nights its not intruding on anyone but freedom people living need to be moved on as well. Sub 052

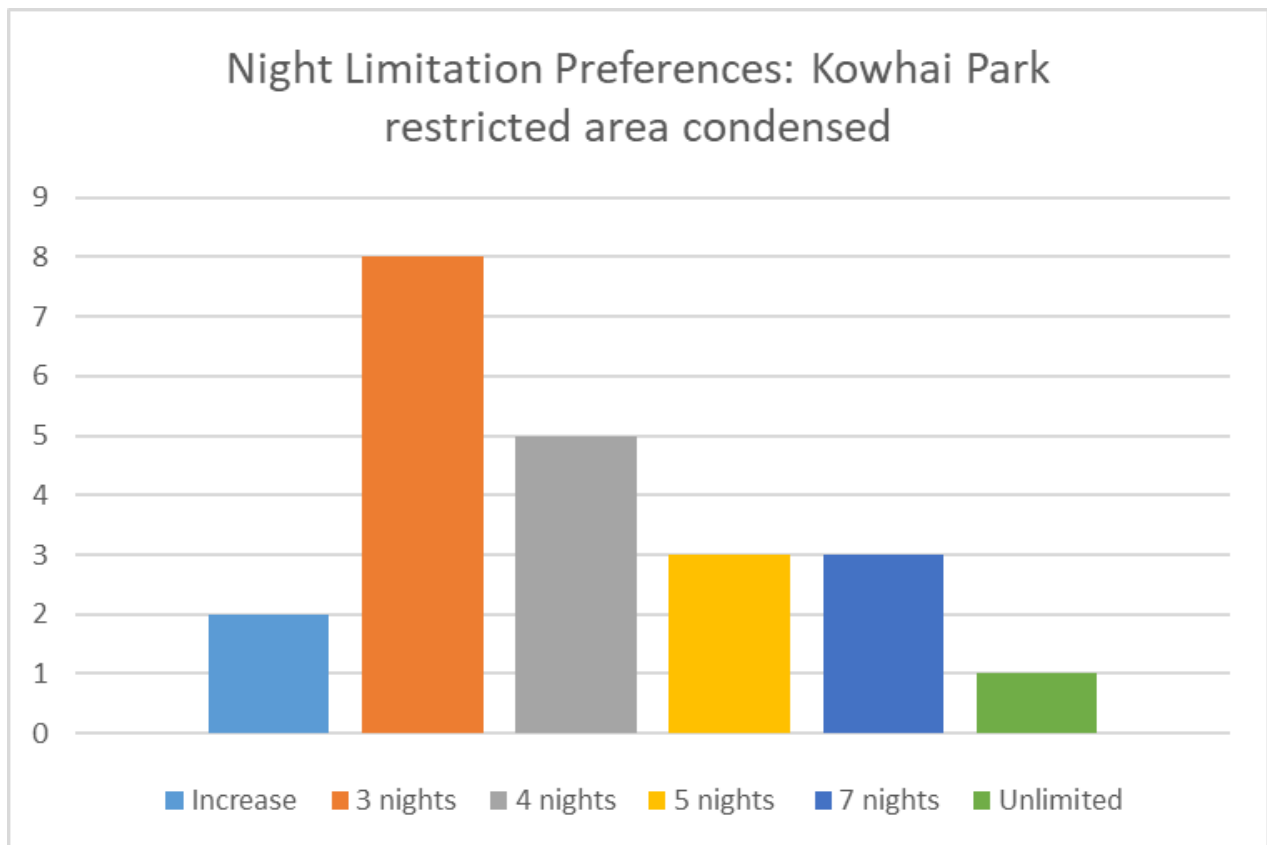
I walk here daily and have noticed that there are freedom campers that stay much longer than those passing through. They more or less set up home there... Sub 125

The most common reason for disagreeing with these proposed controls came from people who would prefer the nights allowed to be increased. This was a comment raised by those who agreed and those who neither agreed nor disagreed also.

Should be max 4 nights in a 30 day period... Sub 002

The length of stay proposed is excessively restrictive, I suggest seven nights. Sub 038

4-5 nights in any 30 day time. this allows those here for events to stay. Sub 047

Consultation topic 8 – Prohibition on Kowhai Park

Freedom camping was proposed to be prohibited in all areas of Kowhai Park not mentioned above.

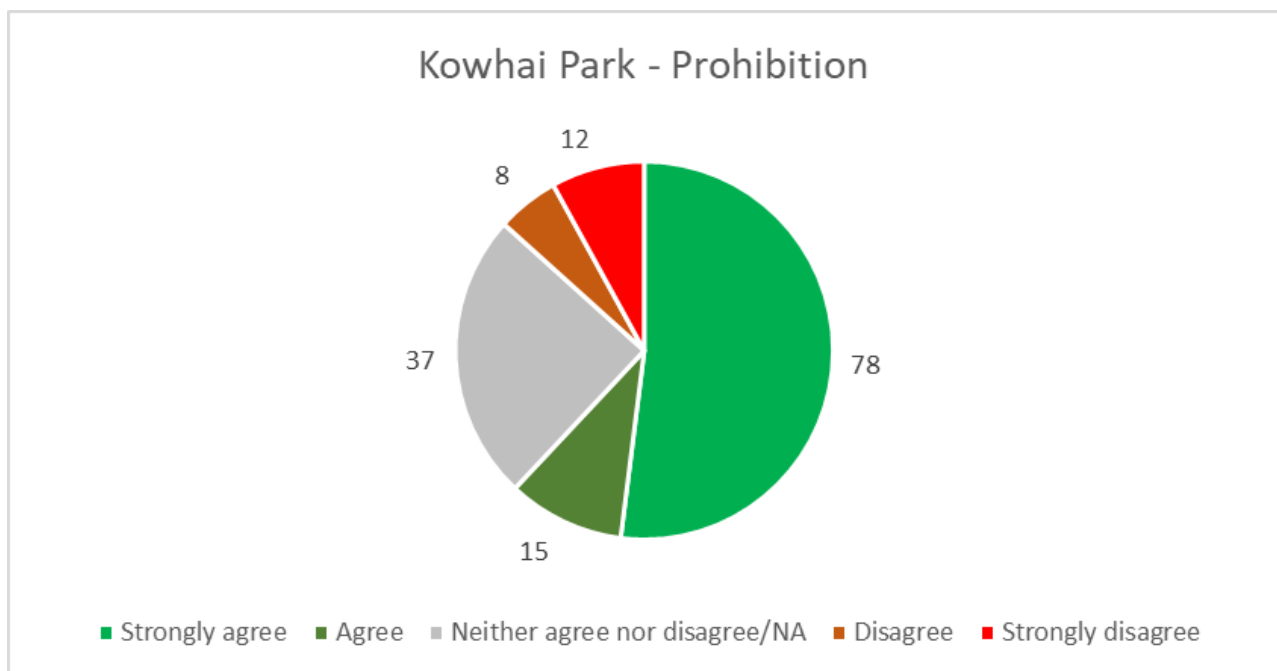


Chart 9 – Proposed prohibition for Kowhai Park

93 submitters either agreed or strongly agreed with this proposed prohibition, followed by 37 who neither agreed nor disagreed or did not answer, and 20 who either disagreed or strongly disagreed. The most common reason given by supporters was to protect the area for local use.

Kowhai park is for children no for adult campers staying days on end.

Sub 019

This is a park for Whanganui citizens and we don't want it cluttered up with oversized vehicles

Sub 030

They already have a designated area that provides amenities for nothing, they should stay within this area and not impose on the wonderful children's playground we have at Kowhai Park.

Sub 039

Consultation topic 9 – Controls on Moutoa Quay

The proposed restrictions for Moutoa Quay were:

- A limit of 2 nights freedom camping per calendar month;
- A maximum of 10 vehicles freedom camping at any one time; and
- Camping is prohibited on Friday nights.

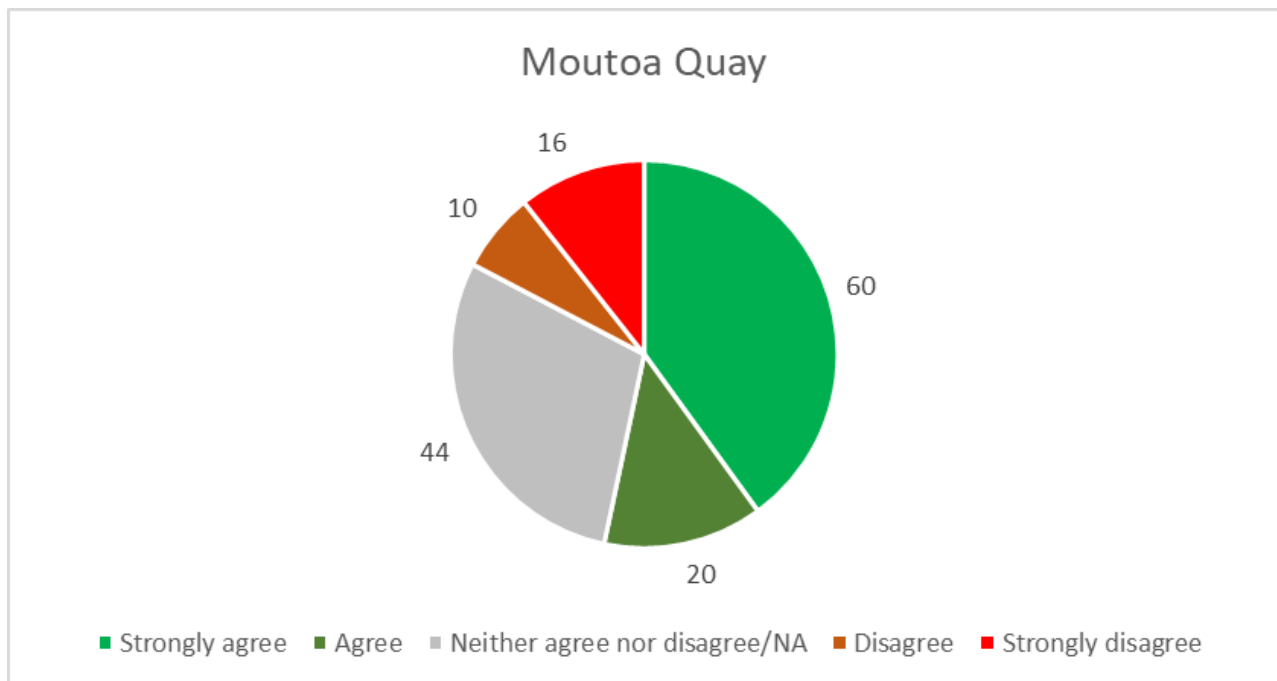


Chart 10 – Proposed restrictions for Moutoa Quay

80 submitters agreed or strongly agreed with the proposed restrictions, compared with 26 who disagreed or strongly disagreed, and 44 who neither agreed nor disagreed or did not answer. Supporters who commented were concerned about parking availability for locals.

Sub 014

This allows a reasonable number of days for freedom campers to use this area. *Sub 062*

Consultation topic 10 – Controls at Mowhanau

This proposal was to allow freedom camping at the top of the lookout, subject to the following restrictions:

- A limit of 2 nights freedom camping per calendar month;
- A maximum of 3 vehicles freedom camping at any one time; and
- Freedom camping permitted in self-contained vehicles only.

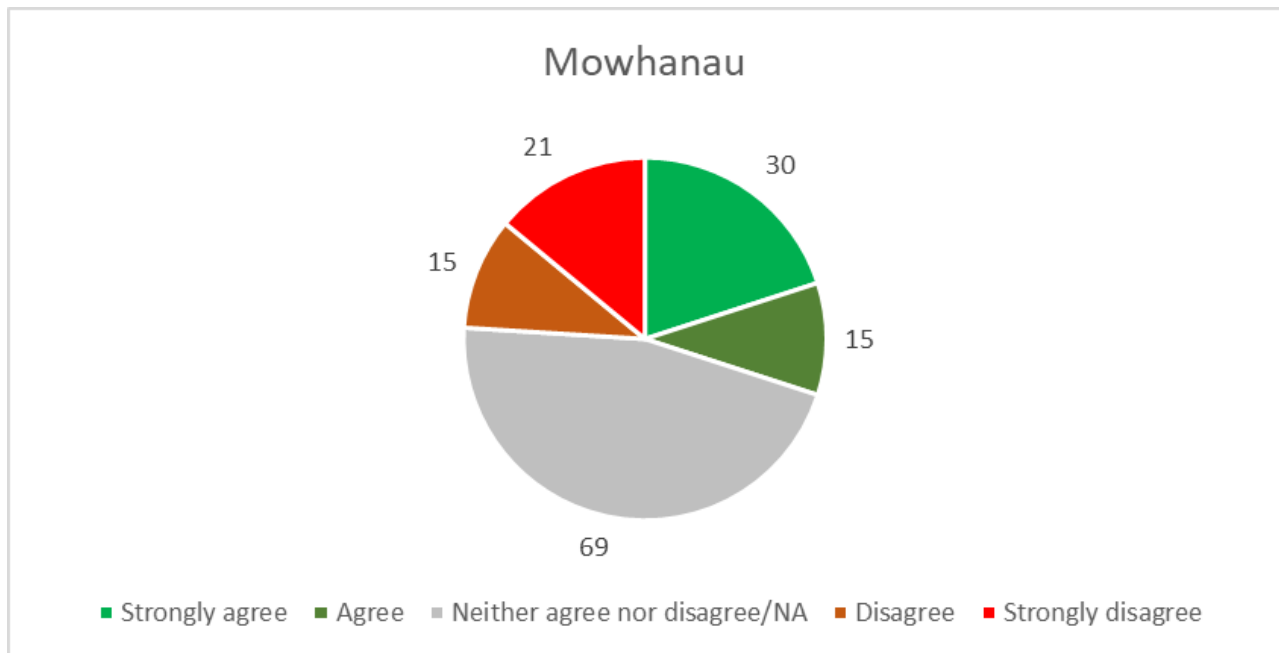


Chart 11 – Proposed restrictions on Mowhanau

69 submitters neither agreed nor disagreed or did not answer, followed by 45 who agreed or strongly agreed, and 36 who disagreed or strongly disagreed. A common comment made by submitters who both agreed and disagreed with the proposed measures was concern for the campsite near the entrance to Mowhanau.

Area to small for more than that and camp ground close already

Sub 079

There is a camp ground there so they should use it

Sub 051

Consultation topic 11 – Controls on Pukenamu Drive

The following restrictions were proposed to apply to the carpark overlooking Bell St:

- A limit of 1 night freedom camping per calendar month;
- A maximum of 2 vehicles freedom camping at any one time;
- Freedom camping permitted in self-contained vehicles only;
- Freedom campers not to spread out around their vehicles; and
- No large vehicles.

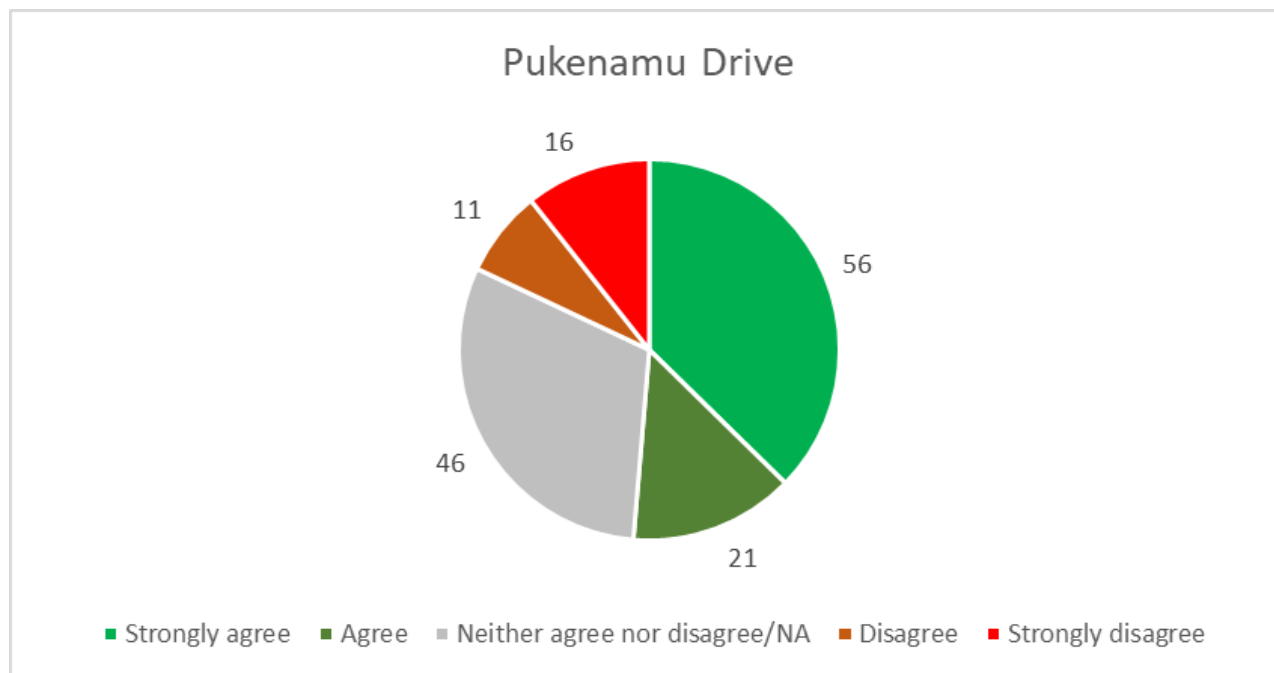


Chart 12 – Proposed restrictions on Pukenamu Drive

77 submitters either agreed or strongly agreed with the proposed restrictions, followed by 46 who neither agreed nor disagreed or chose not to answer, and 27 who either disagreed or strongly disagreed. There were no consistent reasons by those who agreed with the proposed restrictions.

Too tight an area

Sub 028

Extended camping at this site could compromise the safety of people using the Band Rooms, and attending Musician's Club, as both these venues use Pukenamu Drive to park their cars.

Sub 108

Submitters who disagreed mostly felt that freedom camping should be prohibited in this area.

I think this area should be prohibit freedom campers.

I disagree. Camping should be prohibited from this area.

Sub 111

Consultation topic 12 – Controls on the River Road

The following controls were proposed in order to control the impacts of freedom camping along River Road:

- A limit of 2 nights freedom camping per calendar month; and
- Freedom camping limited to self-contained vehicles only.

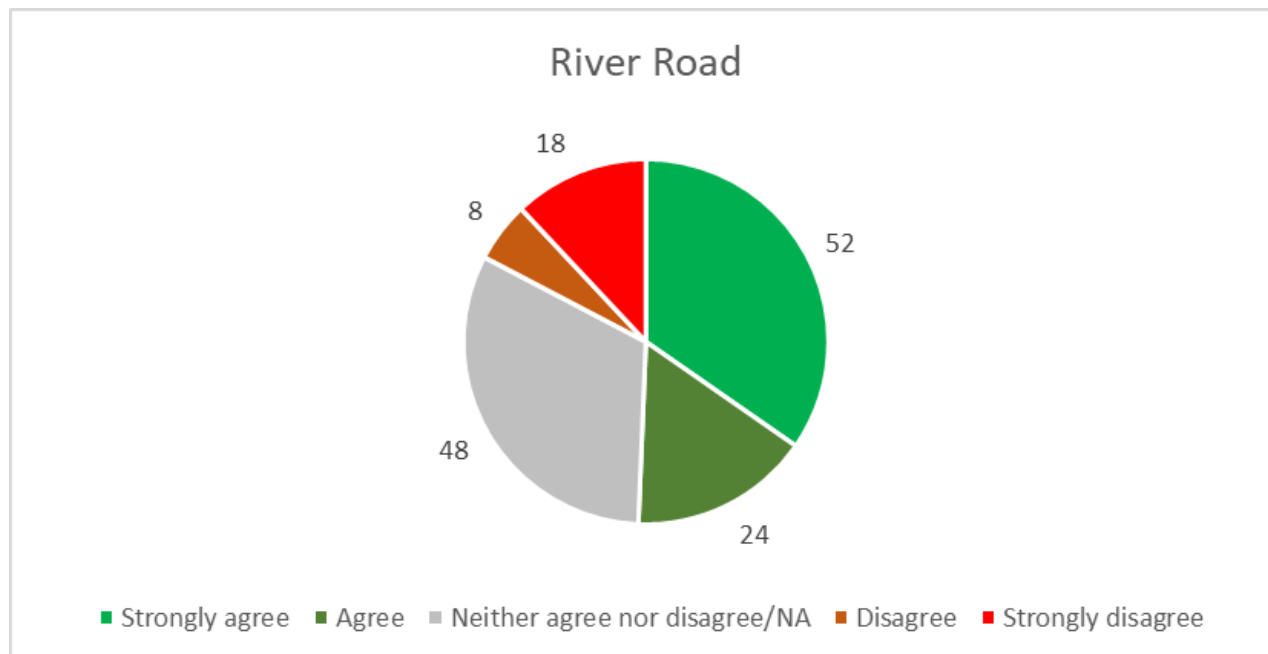


Chart 13 – Proposed restrictions on the River Road

76 submitters agreed or strongly agreed with the proposed restrictions, compared with 26 who disagreed or strongly disagreed, and 48 who neither agreed nor disagreed or did not answer. There were no consistent reasons given for supporting the proposed rules.

Needs local and Iwi feedback. Sub 145

Submitters who opposed the controls would have preferred freedom camping to be prohibited and were concerned that proper engagement had been done with tangata whenua.

Consultation topic 14 – Controls on Springvale Park

The proposed restrictions for the Jubilee Stadium carpark were:

- A limit of 2 nights freedom camping per calendar month;
- A maximum of 10 vehicles freedom camping in the area at any one time; and
- Self-contained vehicles only.

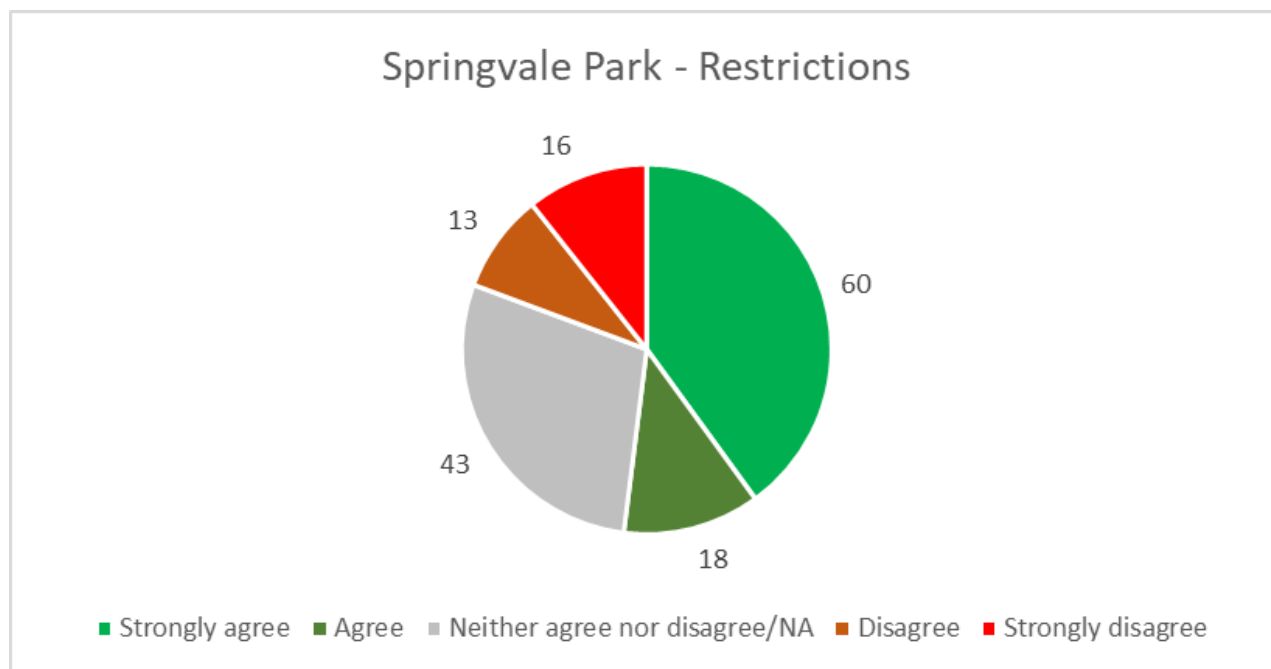


Chart 14 – Proposed restrictions on Springvale Park

78 submitters agreed or strongly agreed with proposed restrictions, followed by 43 who neither agreed nor disagreed or did not answer, and 29 who disagreed or strongly disagreed. Submitters who agreed were primarily concerned with parking availability.

Sub 028

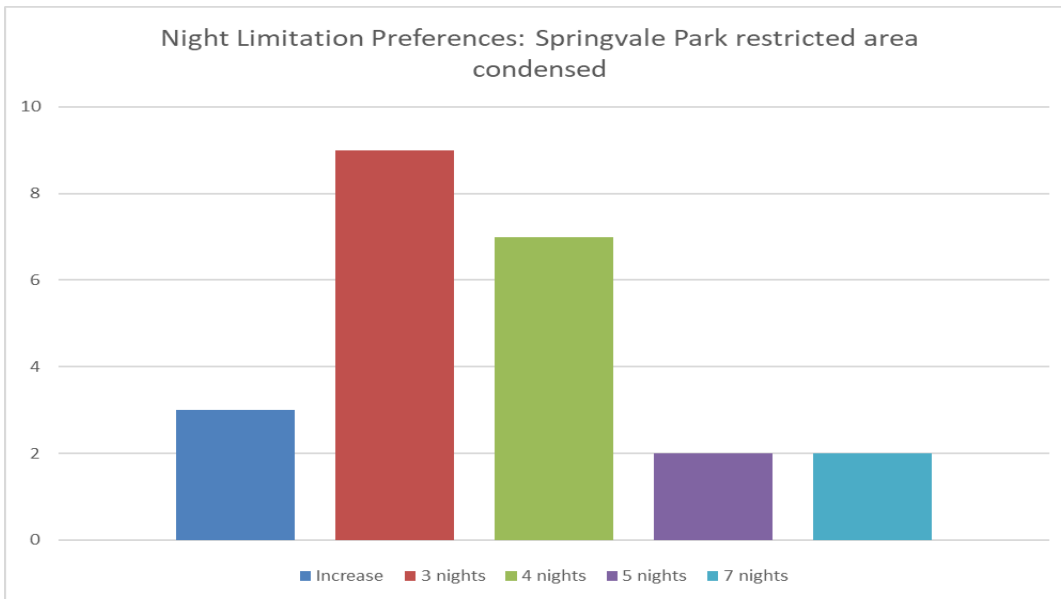
The most common suggestion for this area was to increase the number of nights freedom campers would be able to stay during a calendar month. Suggestions included 3 nights, 4 nights, 5 nights, and 7 nights per calendar month.

Consultation topic 15 – Prohibitions on Springvale Park

The proposal was to prohibit freedom camping on Springvale Park outside of the Jubilee Stadium carpark.

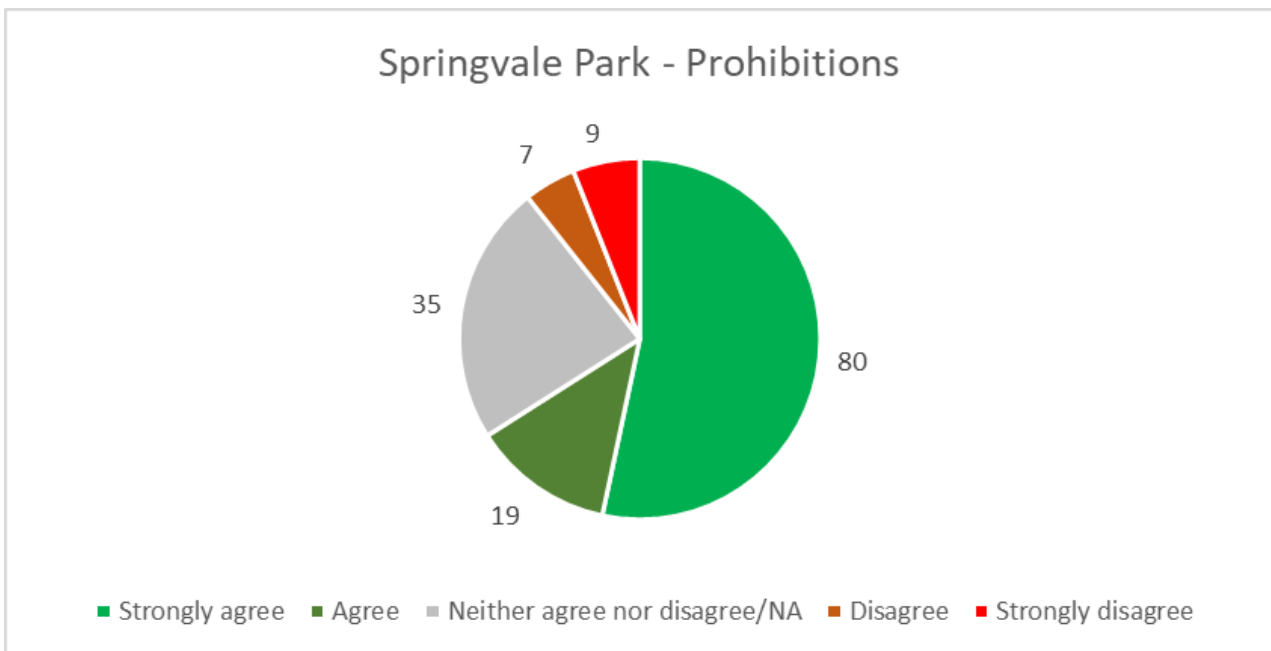


Chart 15 – Proposed prohibition on Springvale Park

99 people agreed or strongly agreed with this proposal, followed by 35 who neither agreed nor disagreed or did not answer, and 16 who either disagreed or strongly disagreed. The most common reason for supporting the prohibition was the preserve it for community use.

I believe that Freedom Camping should be prohibited from Springvale Park. There are numerous Schools in the area which require its use on a regular basis. Sub 021

Consultation topic 16 – Controls on Taupo Quay

The proposed restrictions for Taupo Quay were:

- A limit of 2 nights freedom camping per calendar month;
- A maximum of 3 vehicles freedom camping at any one time; and
- Freedom camping limited to self-contained vehicles only.

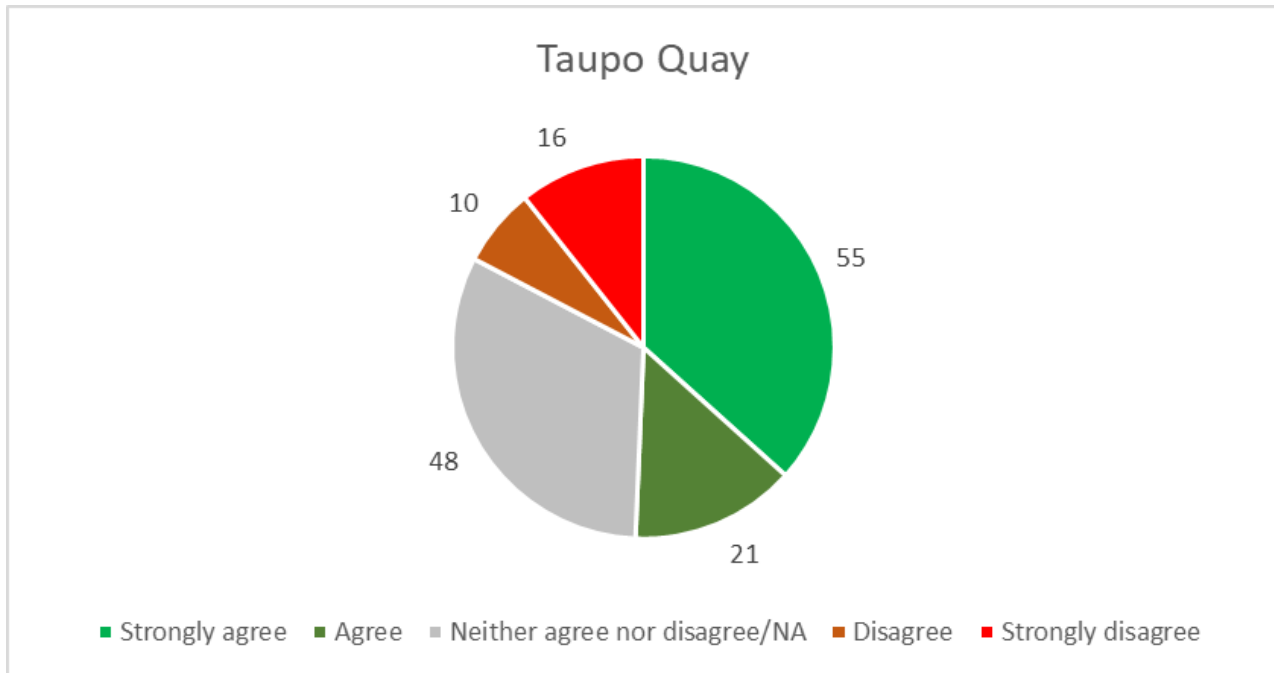


Chart 16 – Proposed restrictions on Taupo Quay

76 people agreed or strongly agreed with these proposals, compared with 48 who neither agreed nor disagreed or did not answer, and 26 who disagreed or strongly disagreed. The most common reason for supporting these controls was concerns about overcrowding in the area.

No room, limited parking, and it's a popular place for walking.

Sub 028

Again a busy area especially at the weekends.

Sub 049

Consultation topic 17 – Controls on Westmere Lake

The proposed controls on Westmere Lake were:

- A limit of 2 nights freedom camping per calendar month;
- A maximum of 3 vehicles freedom camping at any one time;
- Self-contained vehicles only.

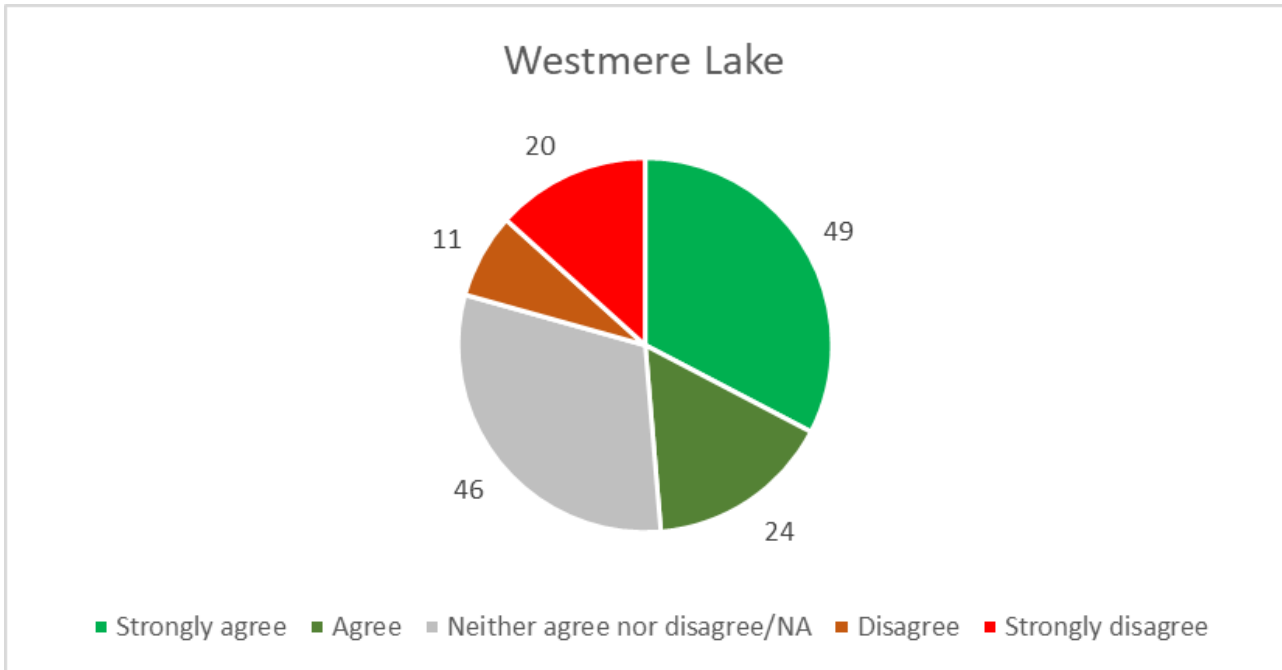


Chart 17 – Proposed restrictions on Westmere Lake

73 submitters agreed or strongly agreed with the proposed restrictions, compared with 31 who disagreed or strongly disagreed, and 46 who neither agreed nor disagreed or did not answer. Although those who agreed were more numerous, the most common reason given was from those who disagreed and would have preferred freedom camping to be prohibited here.

Where, no bloody room, seriously?

Westmere lake has limited parking and it is a beautiful lake and there is no need for campers to be there!

Consultation topic 18 – Buffer Zones

An additional restriction was proposed for almost all prohibited and restricted areas, and this is buffer zones. These are areas in which freedom camping is prohibited, to prevent people from freedom camping on the edges of restricted or prohibited areas.

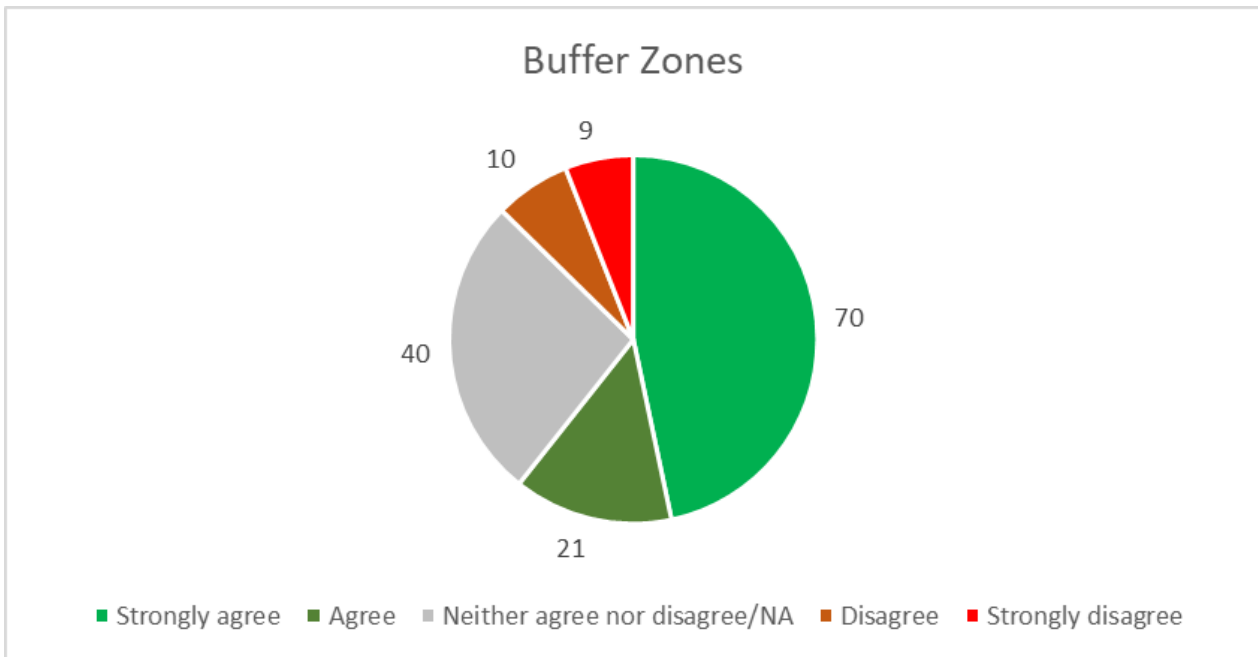


Chart 18 – Support for Buffer Zones

91 submitters agreed or strongly agreed with the proposed restrictions, followed by 40 who neither agreed nor disagreed or did not answer, and 19 who disagreed or strongly disagreed. Submitters who supported the idea mostly did so for practical reasons.

Consultation topic 19 – Other areas

Submitters were invited to propose other areas for restrictions, particularly if they had witnessed issues relating to freedom camping in those areas. The areas proposed by submitters were:

- North Mole;
- Morgan Street;
- Complete prohibition throughout the district;
- South Beach;
- London/Balance Street;
- Pakaitore;
- Carpark outside of Whanganui High School and Jubilee Stadium;
- Landguard's Bluff;
- Mosquito Point; and
- Wiritoa Reserve.

None of these were proposed by more than one or two people.

Next steps

The Terms of Reference for the Committee enables the Committee to make recommendations to the Council on the adoption of the proposed Freedom Camping Bylaw 2021.

Freedom Camping Bylaw 2021

1 **Title**

- (1) This bylaw is the "Freedom Camping Bylaw 2021".

2 **Commencement**

- (1) This bylaw comes into force on 1 November 2021

3 **Application**

- (1) This bylaw applies to the **Whanganui District**.

4 **Purpose**

- (1) The purpose of this **Bylaw** is to regulate the practice of freedom camping in the **Defined Areas** in order to:

- (a) protect those areas;
- (b) protect the health and safety of visitors to those areas; and
- (d) protect access to those areas.

5 **Interpretation**

In this **Bylaw** unless the context otherwise requires or where otherwise expressly provided:

Act means the Freedom Camping Act 2011.

Approval means a licence, permit or other form of written approval granted to allow an activity normally restricted or prohibited under this bylaw, and includes all conditions to which the approval is subject.

Authorised Officer means any person appointed by **Council** to act on its behalf and with its authority, and may include a police officer.

Bylaw means the Freedom Camping Bylaw 2021.

Camping Paraphernalia means any item or items associated with camping including, but not limited to, detached chairs, tables, umbrellas, barbecues, rubbish and recycling receptacles, tents and other semi-permanent structures, washing lines, showering and hygiene equipment or awnings, whether or not the item or items are attached to the vehicle.

Certified Self-Contained or **Self-Contained**, unless otherwise defined in the **Act**, means a **Vehicle** that is certified under the New Zealand Standard Self-Containment of Motor Caravans NZS 5465:2001 and is designed and built for the purpose of camping, which is practically configured to meet the ablutionary and sanitary needs of the current number of occupants of that vehicle for a minimum of three days without requiring access to external services or discharge of waste, as evidenced by the display of a current self-containment warrant issued under NZS 5465:2001.

Note: If a vehicle is certified as self-contained for fewer occupants than it currently has, that vehicle is considered not to be certified as self-contained. For example, a vehicle certified to meet the needs of three occupants but which is housing four or more occupants is considered not to be certified self-contained under this Bylaw.

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Council means the Whanganui District Council or any **Authorised Officer**.

Defined Area means any area referred to in Schedule 1 Table 1 – Restricted Areas or Table 2 – Prohibited Areas.

District or **Whanganui District** means the area within the territorial boundary of the Whanganui District Council.

Freedom Camping and **Freedom Camp** have the meaning given to them by section 5 of the Act.

“5 Meaning of freedom camp

(1) *In this Act, freedom camp means to camp (other than at a camping ground) within 200 m of a motor vehicle accessible area or the mean low-water springs line of any sea or harbour, or on or within 200 m of a formed road or a Great Walks Track, using 1 or more of the following:*

- (a) *a tent or other temporary structure;*
- (b) *a caravan;*
- (c) *a car, campervan, housetruck, or other motor vehicle.*

(2) *In this Act, freedom camp does not include the following activities:*

- (a) *temporary and short-term parking of a motor vehicle;*
- (b) *recreational activities commonly known as day-trip excursions;*
- (c) *resting or sleeping at the roadside in a caravan or motor vehicle to avoid driver fatigue.”*

Local Authority Area has the meaning given to it by section 6 of the Act.

“6 Meaning of local authority area

(1) *In this Act, local authority area—*

- (a) *means an area of land—*
 - (i) *that is within the district or region of a local authority; and*
 - (ii) *that is controlled or managed by or on behalf of the local authority under any enactment; and*
- (b) *includes any part of an area of land referred to in paragraph (a); but*
- (c) *does not include an area of land referred to in paragraph (a) or (b) that is permanently covered by water.*

Park/Reserve means the grassed area, in any land vested in or administered by the Council under the provisions of the Reserves Act 1977; or any park, domain or recreational area under the control or ownership of the Council.

Person includes a corporation sole, a body corporate, and an unincorporated body.

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Vehicle has the meaning given to it by s2 of the Land Transport Act 1998.

“vehicle—

- (a) means a contrivance equipped with wheels, tracks, or revolving runners on which it moves or is moved; and*
- (b) includes a hovercraft, a skateboard, in-line skates, and roller skates; but*
- (c) does not include—*
 - (i) a perambulator or pushchair:*
 - (ii) a shopping or sporting trundler not propelled by mechanical power:*
 - (iii) a wheelbarrow or hand-trolley:*
 - (iv) [Repealed]*
 - (v) a pedestrian-controlled lawnmower:*
 - (vi) a pedestrian-controlled agricultural machine not propelled by mechanical power:*
 - (vii) an article of furniture:*
 - (viii) a wheelchair not propelled by mechanical power:*
 - (ix) any other contrivance specified by the rules not to be a vehicle for the purposes of this definition:*
 - (x) any rail vehicle“*

Note: vehicle includes a campervan

Washing Lines means any strung line outside of a vehicle used for hanging, airing or drying of clothes.

- (1) Any undefined words, phrases or expressions used in this bylaw have the same meaning as in the Act unless the context plainly requires a different meaning.
- (2) Explanatory notes and additional information attached to this **Bylaw** are for information purposes only, do not form part of this **Bylaw**, and may be made, amended, revoked or replaced by **Council** at any time.
- (3) ~~The Interpretation Act 1999 applies to this bylaw as if it were an enactment.~~

Parts 1 and 2 of the Legislation Act 2019 applies to this **Bylaw** as if it was legislation.

6 **Freedom Camping Generally**

- (1) Except with the approval of **Council**, no persons shall **Freedom Camp**:
 - (a) in contravention of controls within any area identified in Schedule 1 Table 1 – Restricted Areas; or
 - (b) within any area identified in Schedule 1 Table 2 – Prohibited Areas.

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7 **Temporary controls**

- (1) The **Council** may temporarily close or restrict **Freedom Camping** in any location where the closure or restriction is considered necessary to:
- (a) prevent damage to that location or facilities in that location; or
 - (b) allow maintenance to that location or facilities in that location; or
 - (c) protect the safety of persons or property; or
 - (d) provide for better public access, including in circumstances where events are planned for that location.
- (2) Notice will be given of any temporary closure or restriction, and the removal of any closure or restriction, in any manner the **Council** considers is appropriate to the reason for the closure or restriction. Prior notice of any temporary closure or restriction will be given where reasonably practicable.

Note: Notice may include any of the following: a sign erected in the area; advertising on the Council's website, official social media pages, or on the radio; notifications via Council-approved apps; and/or a public notice in the paper.

8 **Approval**

- (1) The Council may grant (with or without conditions) or refuse any application for an **Approval** at its discretion.
- (2) **Approvals** under clause 8(1) only be granted in relation to events.
- (3) In deciding to grant or decline any application for an **Approval** the **Council** will consider the following general matters:
- (a) compliance with the standards in schedule 1 tables 1 and 2;
 - (b) reasonableness or practicality of compliance with the general and specific conditions;
 - (c) the location of the activity and whether it is likely to impact an area, the health and safety of visitors to that area, or access to that area;
 - (d) the suitability of a person to hold an approval taking into account any known past operational issues and the applicant's experience and track record;
 - (e) whether the activity is consistent with Council policies and plans;
 - (f) whether the activity is in conjunction with any event(s).
- (4) An **Approval** may be applied for in writing to the **Council** at least 48 hours in advance of the date planned for **Freedom Camping** in the **Defined Area**.
- (5) An **Approval** must be applied for at the same time as consent for the event it is in relation to.

9 **Penalties and offences**

- (1) It is an offence under the Act to breach any provisions of the Act or any of the restrictions provided in this Bylaw.
- (2) Every person who commits an offence under the Act is liable for a penalty of any amount prescribed under [section 23](#) of the Act, or in any regulations made under [section 43](#) of the Act.

Any person who commits an offence under the Act may also be liable for costs associated with repairing any damage caused to a local authority area instead of, or in addition to, any other penalty.

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SCHEDULE 1 – LOCATIONS AND RESTRICTIONS

- (1) Except as expressly provided for, **Freedom Camping** in any area identified under Schedule 1 Table 1 – Restricted Areas is subject to the following general restrictions:
- (a) All vehicles must be parked within marked spaces where provided;
 - (b) Where there are marked designated freedom camping spaces at a location, freedom camping is restricted to the designated freedom camping spaces;
 - (c) Where freedom camping occurs in ordinary marked parking spaces, freedom camping vehicles must be parked with at least one full marked space between them. Where there are specific spaces marked for freedom camping, vehicles may be parked next to each other;
 - (d) Vehicles must not be parked in such a way as to block access to or from any other vehicle or the access of any vehicle to or from any parking space that that vehicle does not directly occupy, or any public area or private property;
 - (e) Where a **Max Time** is given, these are non-consecutive and apply within any calendar month;
Note: A two night time limit means that a freedom camper can only stay in that freedom camping area for three days total within any calendar month.
 - (f) Where a **Max Vehicle** is given, that is the maximum number of vehicles that can be **Freedom Camping** in the specified area at any one time.
 - (g) Where a **Vehicle Type** is specified, only vehicles of that type can be used for **Freedom Camping** in the specified area. Where **Large Vehicles** are referred to, these refer to any vehicle of class 2 or higher;
Note: A vehicle type of "certified self-contained only" means that only vehicles that are certified as self-contained can freedom camp in the specified area. A vehicle type of "any" means that any vehicle can freedom camp in the specified area.
 - (h) Where an area is restricted to "**Contained camping only**", **Camping Paraphernalia** must be contained within any vehicle **Freedom Camping** in that area;
 - (i) Vehicles that are **Certified Self-Contained** must display evidence of their certification at all times;
- (2) **Freedom Camping** is Prohibited:
- (a) within any area identified in Schedule 1: Table 2 – Prohibited Areas;
 - (b) within 500m of the boundary of any **Defined Area** (the **Buffer Zone**), unless otherwise specified in Table 1 – Restricted Areas or Table 2 – Prohibited Areas; and
 - (c) within a tent or other structure on any **Park/Reserve** except where expressly provided for under Schedule 1: Table 1 – Restricted Areas

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(3) **Washing Lines** are prohibited within Schedule 1 Table 1 – Restricted Areas and Schedule 1: Table 2 – Prohibited Areas.

The first was from submitters who would prefer freedom camping to be prohibited entirely along the River Road, and the second was from those who wanted to ensure that the restrictions matched up with the needs and values of tangata whenua. Officers note that the Tamaūpoko hapū collective have been consulted with on the proposed restrictions and, while full engagement is ongoing, no significant objections have been raised to the proposed rules.
