## New signage for Durie Hill elevator

A top Whanganui tourist attraction, the Durie Hill elevator, has had a face-lift with new signage and large historical panels which explain its intriguing workings and past.

What began as a project to improve the signage grew into a much larger refurbishment when Whanganui & Partners Digital and Online lead, Paul Kjoss, dug into the elevator's history and commissioned three interpretive panels to explain how the underground elevator operates, including photographs of historical equipment the public never sees.



Viewing the photographic display is (from left) elevator operator Raewyn Tangaroa, Karen Wrigglesworth, Paul Kjoss, Nick Gibbons and Steve Caudwell After much research, with the help of Whanganui District Council archivist Simon Bloor and others who are passionate about its history, Mr Kjoss found that as well as being New Zealand's only underground elevator, the elevator is also unique for its kind worldwide.

What adds to that rareness is its Mercury Arc Rectifier, which converts alternating current (AC) electricity to direct current (DC) electricity. The elevator was originally supplied by the same powerhouse that generated electricity for Whanganui's tramway network, with the elevator running on 500 volt direct current electricity.

The project has been a collaboration between several organisations, including elevator enthusiast and Council Facilities Management Officer Peter Tantrum, writer and engineer Karen Wrigglesworth, photographer Steve Caudwell of Whanganui Photography Ltd, Nick Gibbons of Morrie Gibbons Signs and long-serving elevator operator, Raewyn Tangaroa.

"Not only will the signage improve the visitor experience, but also will provide information that will appeal to visitors who enjoy a heritage experience," Mr Kjoss says.

#### Jerusalem Bluff works

Road works will be undertaken at Jerusalem Bluff, just before the Jerusalem settlement, on the Whanganui River Road beginning Monday 8 January 2018. The work involves cutting into the existing road to widen it, which is similar to the work which has recently been completed on Shellrock (Oyster) Bluff.

The road is likely to remain open while the work is done, but stop/go controls will be in place for five-to-ten minute periods as required.

### Lake Wiritoa spraying

As part of managing the water weed Homwort (Ceratophyllum demersum) in Lake Wiritoa, the Whanganui District Council will spray on Tuesday 23 January 2018 at the public swimming and water skiing areas.

Depending on the weather, the alternative date for spraying is Wednesday 24 January 2018.

A boat-mounted spray unit will be used to spray Reglone herbicide, which is specifically formulated for use on submerged aquatic weeds.

Please do not draw water from the lake for bathing or drinking, or use for fish fanning or for watering livestock.

The use of the lake for swimming is prohibited for 24 hours after application. Please do not use water for overhead irrigation for 10 days after treatment.

#### Pedestrian bridge closure

The pedestrian bridge at Matipo Park is closed because of safety concerns after a recent structural inspection.
