Have your say on our Long Term Plan

Consultation has opened for Whanganui District Council's Long Term Plan 2018 – 2028.

All members of the community are invited to read the Long Term Plan Consultation Document and make a submission on areas they're interested in.

Mayor Hamish McDouall says hearing from the public is critical to the success of the Council's plan.

"Firstly we want the input of the community. We want to hear the wisdom and perspectives of the people this plan will affect. Secondly, we want people to be informed about the issues we're considering and for them to feel as though they're part of the future of Whanganui, not just bystanders in the process of growing this district."

Mayor McDouall says Whanganui's future is looking increasingly positive. "We have to be ready for growth. And our Long Term Plan looks at how we will be prepared to accommodate new businesses and enough homes for our residents.

"If you have views on rates, Whanganui's port, climate change or recycling or you want to make suggestions about Council amenities or services, it's really important you get involved with this consultation."

The future of Queen's Park

A Draft Reserve Management Plan has been prepared for Pukenamu/Queen's Park, which will guide the management of the reserve for the next 10 years.

The Council is proposing a change to the classification of Pukenamu/Queen's Park from 'local purpose (site of municipal buildings)' to 'local purpose (culture and heritage)' so it more closely reflects the use of the reserve.

The term 'municipal buildings' is considered outdated and there are a number of buildings in the reserve that do not fit that classification.

The Council would also like feedback on inclusion of the Māori name, Pukenamu, in the park's title. Pukenamu (sandfly hill) was the name originally given to the reserve by local Māori.

Low water pressure

Castlecliff area, Saturday 24 March 2018

Low water pressure is expected in the Castlecliff area between 8.00am and 4.00pm on Saturday, 24 March as new and existing supply water mains are joined.

The new 457mm concrete steel-lined pipe replaces an existing 60-year-old pipe and feeds the Castlecliff industrial area. This work began in February 2018.

The water main runs from the back of Belmont Golf Course through to the Tayforth/Westmere Road intersection.
