Whanganui's population on the rise

Our population has risen by 700 people (1.6%), according to the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) and Statistics New Zealand, which selected Whanganui to participate in a Census test in April 2017.

Since 2014, the Whanganui District has been steadily growing, from 43,400 in 2014 to 44,500 in 2017, making the current population the highest it's been since 2000. This is the biggest annual increase since population changes were first recorded in 1996.

Part of the increase is due to growing international migration to Whanganui. In 2014, 63 people migrated to Whanganui from overseas. In 2017, the number increased to 211.

Mayor Hamish McDouall says it is a clear sign that people are seeing Whanganui as an attractive place to live with an enjoyable lifestyle.

"The population increase reflects what people are experiencing – a lot of Whanga-newbies, rising house prices, and a growing economy. The previous two government projections did not seem to reflect the growth that most people could see around them, but the Census test has clearly flagged that Whanganui is becoming more popular," he says.

The Council is working on a Long Term Plan that incorporates this population growth, to ensure Whanganui can provide for a larger number of residents.

GDP per capita has also been rising in Whanganui, reaching \$35,280 in 2017, which is a 3.5% increase from 2016's GDP per capita of \$34.070.

Mayor McDouall says, "Growth in both population and our economy are fantastic signs for Whanganui and signify that our beautiful city is heading in the right direction.

All of these statistics are publicly available on MBIE's Regional Economic Activity App and Statistics New Zealand website. Whanganui was selected to participate in a Census test in 2017 to help Statistics New Zealand test its systems and processes for the nationwide Census in March 2018.
