New name for reserve

Whanganui's Queen's Park will now be known as Pukenamu Queen's Park.

This was one of a number of significant changes adopted by Whanganui District Council after considering submissions on the Pukenamu Queen's Park Reserve Management Plan, the reserve's name and its purpose.

Mayor Hamish McDouall says the quality and depth of the submissions had a big influence on the final plan.

"The plan was altered because of those submissions – it was democracy at work and the result of a collaborative process which included important stakeholders and the community. It is very evident that the future of this reserve means a lot to the whole community."

Fifty-four submissions were received following public consultation on the draft plan. Submissions closed on 25 May with submitters heard in July. The Statutory Management Committee met on Tuesday, 25 September to deliberate.

Resource Management Planner Carolyn McIntyre says the plan will guide the management of the reserve for the next ten years and provides an outline of the Council's intentions for it. An important decision was including the Māori name, Pukenamu, in the reserve's title. It was known to Māori as 'sandfly hill'.

Mosston Road stormwater upgrade

Heads Road and Ruapehu Street restrictions (correction)

Works will be carried out on Heads Road (past Mosston Road at the Castlecliff end) until December 2018. This change has been decided in consultation with nearby residents.

Ruapehu Street will also have detours in place for the next seven weeks.

The Mosston Road stormwater pipe upgrade involves upgrading stormwater services to the Westbourne Manufacturing Zone with a 1350mm concrete pipe.

Please note, the 26 September edition of Community Link advertised that the Ruapehu Street detours were postponed. This was incorrect.

Pipe renewals/water shut-off

Anzac Parade

Water and gas pipes will be replaced on Anzac Parade, between Nixon Street and Nile Street, during the next seven weeks.

Marshall Avenue, from the intersection of Marshall Avenue and Anzac Parade, will close for three days during this work, with access available from Millward Street. More information will be given to residents closer to the time.

Anzac Parade will not be closed for the work, but vehicle access to some properties may be restricted.

Water shut-offs will also be required as part of this work.

Affected residents will be notified by letterbox drop before any water shut-offs and road/access restrictions. Thanks for your patience.
