

Whanganui's appeal wins judges' tick

Whanganui has won the Most Beautiful City and Best Street categories in the Keep New Zealand Beautiful Awards announced at a ceremony in Dunedin last Thursday, 24 October 2019.

The awards celebrate towns, cities and local heroes who lead the way with outstanding environmental and beautification work.

The Most Beautiful Towns and Cities finalists were judged by Keep New Zealand Beautiful chief executive, Heather Saunderson, and celebrity chef Michael Van de Elzen.

Mr Van de Elzen loved the fact that everyone in Whanganui was getting involved in making the city better, from the Council to surrounding iwi. "The recycling centre was just incredible and really set Whanganui apart - I wish every town and city could have one," he says.

Whanganui Mayor-elect Hamish McDouall says winning two categories was quite simply outstanding.

"There has been a big surge in beautification projects happening in Whanganui over the past year – and these wins showcase the town-beautification work and sustainability initiatives that are in our community."



The Ridgway Street precinct between Drews and Victoria avenues won Best Street category.

Councillor-elect Helen Craig, who entered Ridgway Street into the awards in her personal capacity, says, "Ridgway Street is one of New Zealand's most beautiful streets - and it's thanks to Town Centre Regeneration Project Manager, Ellen Young, and citizens like Dave Corney, who have generously supported the pop-up park, that helped us to win this award."

New Tylee Cottage artistin-residence in the frame

Photography and video artist Marie Shannon (pictured) is the new artist-in-residence at Tylee Cottage until January 2020.

Ms Shannon graduated from the University of Auckland's Elam School of Fine Arts with a Bachelor of Fine Arts in 1983.



Her still photographs are characterised by finely rendered detail, made possible with the use of a large-format analogue camera. Ms Shannon's work frequently draws on her immediate environment, and she is interested in presenting the seemingly mundane aspects of everyday life.

Ms Shannon's Tylee Cottage project seeks to display the Whanganui River through a series of photographs and video work. Capturing the river mouth at different times of day, as well as throughout different weather conditions to encapsulate and convey mood and atmosphere, she plans to focus on the details of the water as opposed to the landscape or location.

While artist-in-residence, Ms Shannon also intends to photograph the interior of Tylee Cottage and then construct models of the details.
