

Bridge projects get off the ground

Whanganui District Council is reallocating funding to move ahead with two Whanganui bridge projects - the pedestrian bridge that is part of the Aramoho Railway Bridge, and Erni's Bridge on Kauarapaoa Road.

The council's transportation manager, Damien Wood, says the Aramoho pedestrian bridge (pictured) is an extremely well-used bridge but the surface and structure don't meet Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency's safety specifications. "This work will involve replacing the Aramoho pedestrian bridge so it's wider and can easily accommodate all bikes and mobility scooters."

Reallocating funding means work on the pedestrian bridge can be started this year for completion by July 2024.

The other bridge fast-tracked for replacement - Erni's Bridge on Kauarapaoa Road - is deteriorating rapidly and is in a key location. Damien Wood says, "When the lower culvert at the start of Kauarapaoa Road washes out - as we saw in the December 2021 rainfall events - Erni's Bridge provides the only access to Kauarapaoa Road.



"It's an essential piece of infrastructure not only for residents but also for trucks transporting logs from Kauarapaoa Road forestry blocks to Whanganui distribution points and wider regional distribution hubs."

Plastic Free July upcycling!

Plastic Free July 2023 coincides with a central government move to ban hard-torecycle and single-use plastic items from supermarkets, hospitality businesses, pharmacies, schools and hospitals. The Ministry for the Environment ban came



into effect on 1 July, and is the second tranche in the ministry's strategy to transition New Zealand away from hard-to-recycle plastics following a ban on single-use shopping bags in 2019. This country is now the first in the world to ban single-use plastic produce bags.

Local advocates Plastic Free Whanganui have organised a range of activities to support Plastic Free July. The group will have a stall at the Whanganui River Markets each Saturday during July to raise awareness about plastic pollution and offer alternatives, with produce bags (upcycled from old net curtains) available to buy. Springvale Park toilets

Temporary closure for maintenance

Maintenance work on the Springvale Park toilets begins today, Wednesday 5 July, and is expected to take a week. The main toilet block will be closed during the work period but the accessible toilet will remain open during daylight hours.

Waitahinga closure

Pest control work during July-August

The Waitahinga conservation and recreation area, inland from Kai Iwi, is closed for pest control work during July and August.

This work is necessary as pests like possums. goats, deer and pigs are damaging the undergrowth. Possum traps are laid by an approved contractor, and the work also involves shooting goats, deer and pigs. The only bait being used is a mixture of flour and icing sugar to attract possums to the traps.

Signs will be displayed notifying the work, and the control operation will take place throughout the entire site including the trails. Please do not enter the Waitahinga site during the pest control period.

Intersection closure

Purnell-Ingestre streets on 10-12 July

With rail crossing repairs completed last month, the intersection of Purnell Street and Ingestre Street will be closed from 7.00am next Monday, 10 July until 5.00pm on Wednesday, 12 July 2023 to allow KiwiRail to seal the roading surface around the rail crossing.

Hatrick Street East and West will serve as detours around the worksite during the repairs pedestrians are asked to also use these detours.
