Summer swim spot monitoring

Before taking a dip at your favourite Whanganui swim spot this summer, you can easily check the quality of the water thanks to Horizons Regional Council's monitoring programme.

Horizons began its annual summer monitoring programme earlier this month. About 80 sites across the region, including beaches like Castlecliff and Kai Iwi and Dudding and Wiritoa lakes, are checked weekly.

Water samples collected by Horizons staff are sent to an independent laboratory for testing. Results are then uploaded to **www.lawa.org.nz** so people can check before they head out.

Swim spots are tagged by a red, amber or green location marker, indicating the most recent test results and if the water is suitable for swimming based on Ministry of Health guidelines.

Horizons environmental monitoring scientist Ian Hurst says staff monitor the levels of faecal indicator bacteria and potentially toxic algae (cyanobacteria) in the water.

"Coming into contact with water where these organisms are present in sufficient quantities can lead to conditions such as gastroenteritis, respiratory illness, and ear and skin infections."

Anzac Parade resilience



Whanganui District Council and Horizons Regional Council emergency management personnel will be out delivering packs to Anzac Parade residents later this week, with information on how they can be informed, prepared and ready to act in the event of a large flood.

The information packs are a result of recommendations from a strategy prepared by Massey University, alongside residents and both councils to improve community resilience and build awareness in an area which has a history of flooding.

Whanganui District Council emergency manager Tim Crowe will be one of the team delivering information packs this week.

"When we considered appropriate ways of providing information for households, we identified the need for information they can hold on to and refer to time and again as useful, particularly as there are a number of rental properties in the area, which usually see a turnover of tenants."

At Kai Iwi Beach (pictured), please keep well clear of the cliffs as they are prone to slipping. A section of cliff face collapsed last week, showing slips can happen with little warning.

As well as checking water quality, Mr Hurst advises swimmers to stay out of the water if it has been raining heavily within the last 72 hours, as this can create faster-flowing water and contribute to higher levels of faecal contamination.

If you require a Land Information Memorandum (LIM) report before the 2023-24 Christmas / New Year holiday period, your completed application form and payment must reach Whanganui District Council **no later than 5.00pm on Friday, 8 December 2023.**

Applications made after Friday, 8 December may not be processed before the council closes for the holiday period at **12 noon on Friday, 22 December 2023.**

The statutory 10-working day processing timeframe for LIM applications will be suspended from **12 noon on Friday**, **22 December 2023 until Wednesday**, **10 January 2024** inclusive.
