

Airport makes hay while sun shines

There is about 54 hectares of grassed land at Whanganui Airport with three grass runways criss-crossing the airfield.

The angled grass runways allow the smaller single-engine aircraft to land when there is too much crosswind on the main runway.

While the grass runways are kept short for aircraft use it's too costly and time-consuming to mow the rest of the airfield so this is left to grow long and made into hay each summer (pictured).

Whanganui Airport manager, Phil McBride, says, "This summer the grass was cut earlier in the season and made into a mix of baleage and hay. A trial area was also planted with lucerne to determine if this higher-value crop may be suitable to provide an alternative income source for the airport.

"If left to dry the long grass becomes a fire hazard so it has to be cut every year. It can be like herding cats though, with up to six tractors and two trucks working on the airfield mowing, tedding, raking and baling the grass."



Unlike making hay on a farm the bales can't be left scattered all over the airfield, so they are immediately moved clear of the runways.

To co-ordinate aircraft activities, an airport safety officer is present on the airfield whenever the haymaking team are working. The UNICOM operator in the control tower adds the final safety measure to ensure the proper separation of aircraft and vehicles is maintained.

Three Waters stimulus projects completed or in pipeline


Whanganui's stormwater, wastewater and water infrastructure continues to benefit from more than \$6 million allocated by central government as part of its Three Waters stimulus project fund. The fund was launched in July 2020 following the first COVID-19 lockdowns.

Several projects have been completed and others are in progress, including the renewal of the Westway pipe bridge (pictured).

The pipe bridge spans 64-metres with a maximum height of eight-metres and services the sewer main that takes the bulk of wastewater from Durie Hill. The bridge and pipeline are more than 100 years old and the pipe, which forms a large portion of the bridge structure, is corroded.
