Regarding this part, in general, we support the Whanganui District Council's proposal to implement safer and more appropriate speeds on the roads around Whanganui.

For the following reasons

The urban environment is a determinant of health and wellbeing. The Public Health Agency has identified four inter-related principles¹ to consider in urban development processes to achieve pae ora (healthy futures) and achieve thriving outcomes for our communities. These principles are:

- healthy, safe and resilient communities
- wai ora healthy environments
- equity
- climate change mitigation and adaptation.

Pae ora is a holistic concept that includes three interconnected elements: mauri ora (healthy individuals), whānau ora (healthy families) and wai ora (healthy environments). These three elements are mutually reinforcing and strengthen improvements in health outcomes over time.

By recognising likely patterns and requirements of future communities, we can use planning and development to anticipate and respond to the health, wellbeing and equity needs of Aotearoa populations in the most effective way.

The principles that relate directly to this management plan are:

Healthy, safe and resilient communities

Communities can be healthy, safe and resilient when all government plans adequately consider and address the socioeconomic determinants of health and wellbeing. Healthy and resilient communities rely on built environments that are accessible and safe for all people living in New Zealand.

Equity

Health NZ believes this Speed Management Plan meets its equity principles by providing improvements to the safety of all people, regardless of their ethnicity or chosen identity, and specifically supports those with disabilities.

In General

Transport is an important determinant of health, sickness and injury. The mechanisms of this relationship are numerous. Road safety, vehicle emissions and air quality, physical activity

levels and accessibility are some of the many factors associated with transport that have a profound impact on population health and wellbeing.² When transport and land use planning acknowledge and take these factors into account at the highest level of strategic policy-making, there is potential to make significant gains in improving health and wellbeing and reducing inequity and healthcare costs.³

Burden of injury due to road crashes

New Zealand is one of the worst performing countries in the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development in terms of road safety with a higher rate of death on roads than most of the other developed countries.⁴

Road crashes and social cost

The social cost of road crashes is enormous. Road crashes cost New Zealand an estimated \$4.6 billion in 2019.⁵ It also burdens our health system by increased hospitalisation, medical costs and long-term healthcare needs. In 2018, there were 4,363 hospitalisations for traffic-related injuries in New Zealand, and the rate has continued to rise.⁶

Higher speeds result in more severe injuries and deaths

The speed we drive on our roads is a significant public health and safety issue in New Zealand.⁷ A recent study found that 60% of fatal crashes in New Zealand were attributed to speeding.¹⁰ It means fewer New Zealanders would be killed and injured if we slowed down.

Speed management is a very successful measure to prevent deaths and injuries. International evidence showed that reducing speed to 30km/hr means a huge reduction in deaths and injuries. ^{11,12} A study conducted in London showed that reducing speed limits to 20 mph (approximately 30km/hr) reduced road casualties by 42%. ¹² New Zealand research also showed that traffic speed reductions have been effective at reducing injuries and deaths. ^{11,12}

The risk of death or serious injury to a person walking or cycling decreases significantly with reductions in vehicle speed. A person walking or cycling hit by a vehicle that is travelling at 30km/hr has a 90% chance of survival. However, if they are hit by a vehicle travelling at 50km/hr, their chance of survival decreases to 20%. ¹³ Once the impact speed reaches 70km/hr, the chance of survival is virtually zero. ¹ This is particularly relevant around schools and developed urban areas where a reduced speed limit would further improve safety for all road users.

Slower speeds reduce environmental effects and can lead to health gains

As speed increases above 50 km/hr, the level of CO, NO_x and particulate emissions increases, which degrades air quality. At high speeds, emissions of CO₂ are high. Reducing speeds therefore helps mitigate the significant contribution of transport to Whanganui District greenhouse gas emissions and supports climate change actions.

Another environmental effect of speed is noise. Vehicle noise increases with increasing speed due to noise from the tyre-road interaction.⁷

Cardiovascular disease, mental ill-health, cancer and obesity are among the major public health challenges in New Zealand, many of which are potentially preventable. ¹⁴ Reduced speed limits promote active transport by encouraging physical activity, increasing the

walkability of a neighbourhood and improving the actual or perceived safety of walking and cycling. Active transport contributes to decreased likelihood of obesity, improved mental health and reduced risk of diseases, such as cardiovascular diseases and cancer. 14,15,16 When more people walk and cycle it is also likely to reduce emissions, reduce noise, and improve air quality as well as supporting environmental sustainability. 17

Summary

Health NZ supports the Plan. It meets the principles for healthy urban development and aligns with the goals and aspirations of our national public health service.

There is evidence to suggest that reducing speeds on city roads will:

- reduce traffic-related injuries and deaths
- reduce the burden on our communities and health services
- reduce vehicle emissions, leading to better air quality and a reduction in greenhouse gases
- · reduce road noise
- encourage people to pursue active transport options, which will improve the health of individuals and communities
- contribute towards equity of health outcomes.

I wish to submit specifically about speed limits on Matarawa Valley Road and Matarawa Hill Road in Okoia. Small landholdings are being sub-divided off farms in Matarawa Valley and a number of new homes are being built. Traffic has increased significantly in the past five years. The valley road is single lane and gravel after the first 2km. The shoulders are rough, soft in winter and sometimes bogged or non-existent, with deep non-obvious drains in places. There are a number of blind corners. The road is currently signposted 100km/hr but this is manifestly unsafe. To pass, vehicles must slow right down and both move off onto the shoulders and edge past each other. Dangerous speeds and behaviour sometimes occur. I ask the Council to investigate, to consult as necessary and reduce the speed limit to a more realistic level that encourages safer driving.

The Matarawa Hill Road is a very important connector for the valley community; for those living on the gravel portion of the road, it is a swift and direct route to No 2 Line. It cuts out 2 km of the valley road and a number of blind corners on that section. The road has been damaged because of erosion but is still usable. It is however steep, narrow, metalled and has two blind corners and a washout at the top where the seal ends and the road begins its sharp descent. This road is not a problem for locals who know it and drive to its conditions and it needs to be kept open.

The problem lies with Google and Apple Maps directing people down the hill road who are not familiar with the conditions. The washout, gravel and narrowing of the road are not at all visible at the junction with No 2 Line, when people turn into the road. As examples: the truck that delivered two 30,000 litre water tanks after dark to my farm used this road, because Maps directed him to do so and it was impossible to turn around—once he turned into the road, he had no option but to descend it. In another incident, a horse float unwittingly used the road, entirely unprepared to meet farming traffic. I was nearly run off the road at the middle blind corner last week by a not-local driver who took the corner at excessive speed.

I submit that the road should be clearly signposted—crucially at the junction with No 2 Line and perhaps also at the junction with Matarawa Valley Road:

Not suitable for heavy vehicles

Resident access only

30 km/hr speed limit

This would hopefully make for safer driving behaviour and reduce the risk of accidents; and reduce use of the road and correspondingly, wear and tear on the surface. Okoia Road is a far safer option for non-locals who are not familiar with the roads.

Proposal for Reduced Speed Limits and Safer School Crossing on Mosston Road outside Mosston School

Dear Submission Committee,

On behalf of the Mosston School Board, I am writing in concern for our Mosston School tamariki and staff, who cross Mosston Road to attend school daily.

Currently, Mosston Road has a speed limit of 60 km/h, which is lowered to 40km/h (with timed speed control signs) outside of Mosston School between the hours of 8.25am – 9.00am, and 2.45pm – 3.15pm on weekdays.

However, the 40km/h speed limit simply is not enough to ensure the safety of our tamariki. Mosston Road is a busy road, which is only going to increase in traffic volume in the future with increased housing in the area, alongside further development of the Heads Road and Mill Road industrial areas. Not only do we see heavy traffic, particularly after 3.00pm each day, but also in recent years, we have seen an increase in large trucks travelling back and forth.

The majority of our 170 odd students live in the Springvale area and the safest route for those biking and walking to and from school, is via the walkway at the end of Buxton Road, and to then they cross outside Canaan Honey. Recent improvements to the footpath accessing the school have bettered the situation slightly, nonetheless these improvements have not been able to aid safety of our tamariki walking along Buxton Road in the live vehicle lanes because there is no footpath or maintained berm, or when crossing Mosston Road.

Our families are encouraged to delay their arrival at school until after 8.30am to coincide with lower speed limits each morning. While in the afternoons, our staff are vigilant in supporting up to 15 students to cross the road at the end of the school day. That said, safety is a huge concern for our staff as:

- drivers do not always follow the speed limit,
- the crossing point has limited visibility with limited reaction time particularly when looking towards Castlecliff,
- gaps in traffic are hard to come by, and
- there is always great risk as students can trip and fall when rushed to cross the road.

Mission Statement

To nurture positive relationships and create lifelong learners Poipoia te wairua o te tamaiti kia puta aia ki te ao mārama Lower speed limits outside of Mosston School would create a safer environment for all road users. It is also likely we will see an increase in students walking and biking to school, resulting in fewer cars on the road, not to mention more active kids and the associated health benefits.

We are also concerned that the new footpath along Mosston Road connecting Springvale Road to Mosston School means that our students will have to cross two very busy intersections (Tayforth and Montgomery) to walk to school along this route. It would have been much safer to locate the footpath on the other side of the road allowing safer crossings outside 143 Springvale Road, where there is good visibility, thus avoiding crossing both those intersections. Cyclists could have used it too. Unfortunately, our input was not sought on this.

As stated by Whanganui District Council:

"It is known that 30km/h is the highest speed at which a pedestrian and car collision is usually survivable."

So let us prioritise our tamariki and make the changes necessary so they can attend school safely.

Recommendations from the Mosston School Board would be to:

- Reduce the permanent speed limit on Mosston Road to 50 km/h.
- Implement a 30 km/h speed limit during designated peak times along both Mosston Road and Buxton Road (e.g. before and after school).
- Establish a designated school crossing both before and after school with a legally enforceable school road crossing to allow for safe crossing or our tamariki and whānau.
- Erect signage on Mosston Road and Buxton Road advising motorist to share the road with pedestrians and cyclists

We encourage the submission committee to take on our recommendations and urgently make change before a serious, and preventable, accident occurs. The last thing any of us want to experience is the trauma of a child/vehicle collision on one of our district's roads.


The Mosston School Board are willing to work alongside Mosston School staff and council to find suitable solutions and explore additional safety measures.



Further to the proposed changes to the speed limits on feeder roads to Airport Road – namely Landguard Road and the feeder road to the Pound and Waste Water Treatment plant, we would like to propose further rationalisation of the speed limits along Wikitoria and Airport Roads. These proposed changes would complement the proposed introduction of 30km/h speed zones to the aforementioned feeder roads


We would like to suggest reducing the speed limit at the 50km/h to 100km/h transition at RP660m on Wikitoria Road to a new speed limit of 60km/h. This new 60km/h speed limit would run through to RP1.53km that will transition in to the newly proposed 30km/h zone.

Our reasons for the proposed amendment are as follows:

- Travelling west along Wikitoria Road the speed limit returns to a 100km/h zone just before Onetere Drive and the intersections of Landguard Road and Airport Road.
- This means the effective speed limit in Onetere Drive is 100km/h and that traffic speeds up just before encountering these intersections.
- This section of road also hosts PERTH Concrete and the associated heavy truck movements across the road just before the rise.
- Further truck movements are also encountered mid-way up the hill at 1c Airport Road with Bullocks trucks entering and exiting the forestry land.
- We also note that there is a planned 18 lot rural subdivision at 1c Airport which would further intensify traffic along the beginning of Airport Road.
- Airport Road and Wikitoria roads also hosts heavy traffic during Oceanview Speedway and Whanganui Motocross Track events. (During these events one-way systems are often put in place to improve traffic safety).
- The transition of the present 100km/h to 60km/h will facilitate better transition into the proposed 30km zones along Airport Road, Landguard Road and the side road into the Waste Water Treatment Plant and Pound.

We have six school buses delivering students to-and-from school on Purnell Street. Many parents drive their children to-and-from school in the morning and in the afternoon. Tayforth and Francis Roads.

These roads present a high risk of injury to road users due to the following factors:

- high speed limit (100km/hr)
- narrow carriageway (less than 6.5m)
- high access density / driveways (>10/km), some with limited sight lines
- mixed use with high number of cycle users (this is a very popular recreational route and is used for commuting to work and school)
- curved alignment
- high level of heavy traffic from agricultural and quarry activity
- increasing traffic volume related to population growth
- increasing use of oversized SUVs and utes
- activities with people and horses outsides of vehicles on road side (Pony club on Tayforth Road)

The number of reported crashes is not high, however this represents a gross underestimation. There are 3 crashes in the last 12 months I am aware of that have not been officially registered.

The One Network Framework, developed by Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency provides guidance for setting speed limits, according to road type. Tayforth and Francis Roads, when considered as "Rural Roads" should be set at 60-80km/hr. They do not meet criteria for speeds higher than 60km/hr (see risk factors outlined above). Even if considered as "Rural Connector" the recommended speed limit is 60km/hr given the access density of over 10 per km.

The Speed Management Guide, also produced by Waka Kotaki NZ Transport Agency recommends priority be given to roads with proximity to schools and roads with high level of use by active transport users, criteria which these roads satisfy.

On a personal note I have many close calls riding my bike along this road, and my wife and two young children had a close call when attempting to exist our driveway last week. It is not a safe road to travel on by active transport nor by motorised modes currently. I urge you to please consider reducing this speed limit with urgency.




Figure 119 Map showing location of St Mary's School

1.1.3 Road environment

The school has frontage to three roads being London Street, Russell Street and Tay Street. The main entrance is on London Street.

The following descriptions apply to each street:

1.1.4 London Street

London Street is classified as a secondary collector in the Whanganui roading hierarchy

It carries an annual average daily traffic volume of 1,280 vehicles per day

Its seal width is 8.0 metres between kerbs

It has a footpath on the school side of the road

There is a pedestrian facility opposite the school entrance for foot traffic to cross the Castlecliff spur railway line. There is a yellow painted dashed "NO STOPPING" line on the road shoulder opposite the school gate to stop people parking across the access to the rail crossing.

There is a parallel parking bay on the school side of London street provided for vehicles to parallel park on the street

There is a solid white painted centreline on the approaches to the intersections of Russell Street and Barrack Street

The estimated speed environment along this section of London Street is less than 40 km/h

1.1.5 Russell Street

Russell Street is classified as a secondary collector road in the Whanganui District roading hierarchy

It carries an annual average daily traffic volume of 500 vehicles per day

Its seal width is 8.2 metres between kerbs

It has a footpath on both sides of the road

It has a solid white painted centreline on the approaches to its intersections with London Street and Tay Street.

A bus stop is marked on the side of the road nearest the school. When buses stop here, children crossing Russell Street cannot be seen by or see approaching traffic until they move out onto the road either in front of or behind the school bus.

The estimated speed environment is between 40 and 50 km/h, but is much slower before and after school times when congestion occurs around school drop off and pick up times.

1.1.6 Tay Street

Tay Street is classified as a low volume road in the Whanganui District roading hierarchy

The average annual daily traffic volume on Tay street between Russell Street and Barrack Street is 125 vehicles per day

The carriageway has a sealed width of 7.6 metres between kerbs.

There are solid white painted centrelines on Tay Street approaching its junctions with Barrack Street and Russell Street

There are some yellow paint dashed "NO STOPPING" lines marked across couple of driveways

Cars park along both sides of Tay Street effectively making it one lane wide for through traffic

There is a footpath along both sides of Tay Street

The estimated speed environment would be around 30 to 40 km/h depending on how many parked vehicles are along Tay Street.

1.1.7 School's concerns in 2008

St Marys School advised the following concerns in 2008:

Parking on Russell Street causing problems. They reported a child who was hit by a vehicle received minor injuries when walking out onto the traffic lane by the school bus.

1.1.8 School's concerns in 2019

In 2019, GHD invited St Mary's School to fill in the NZ Transport Agency's "School Road Safety Survey forms. ST Mary's School identified the following concerns:

No pedestrian crossing on London Street between the school gates and the pedestrian crossing on the Castlecliff railway branch line.

Trains often come through at 3:00 pm just as school is coming out and add to the congestion problems that occur at this time of day. A number of families drop off and pick up their children from Seddon Street and walk across the railway tracks to get to and from school.

Parents / care-givers often stop on the opposite side of the road to the school to drop off and pick children up

Parents / care-givers stop on yellow dashed "NO STOPPING" lines and across driveways in spite of the school putting out cones on the yellow lines to stop drivers doing this.

Parents / care-givers not crossing the streets in the patrolled areas thereby setting a bad example to their and others children.

Children alighting from vehicles on the road side of the vehicle rather than the footpath side.

Drivers not indicating when manoeuvring in or out of parallel car parks on the road.

Congestion, especially after school

There is no on-site parking spaces for parents / care-givers to drive into the school grounds to drop off or pick up their children. The only on-site parking is for staff and genuine school visitors, like courier drivers, the police education officer etc.

The speed of trains past the school are too high

Drivers tend to drive too fast in the vicinity of the school

Children not being adequately restrained in vehicles

The green parking area for parents / care-givers is available on the opposite side of the railway tracks. However, this area tends to get boggy when the green area gets very wet.

1.1.9 Actions taken by St Mary's School to address road safety issues

St Mary's School takes the following actions to address road safety issues around the School:

The police education officer attends school annually to teach about safe walking and riding to and from school

School staff and older children supervise children crossing London Street and the Castlecliff branch railway line. This is operating like a Kea Crossing but without the legal protection and signs of an approved Kea Crossing.

Parents / care-givers are encouraged to walk their children across the railway crossing and streets on their way to and from school.

The school tries to reinforce the "NO STOPPING" limits by placing cones on them but many drivers ignore the lines and the cones and stop there anyway. Drivers may ignore these cones because they are very small. It may be more effective to use full sized road cones instead and place them further out into the road so drivers cannot stop there.

The school encourages parents/ care-givers living on the other side of the railway tracks to drop off and pick up their children on the Seddon Street side of the railway line to help reduce congestion in the streets around the school.

Recessed parallel parking has been provided along the school's frontage with London Street.

School staff now park their vehicles on the grass berm along Seddon Street to help relieve congestion around the school. The staff then walk through across the railway tracks at the formed pedestrian rail crossing then across London Street to get to and from school. This action by the school has been a big help in freeing up car park spaces around the school during the day.

A school bus stopping bay has been marked on Russel Street for busses picking up and dropping off school children

1.1.10 Council Actions taken

The Council has taken a number of actions over the years in an attempt to improve road safety around the school. These include:

Council closed London Street to through traffic by shutting it down at the Halswell Street intersection. This stopped people using it as a high-speed rat run and took a lot of traffic off this section of London Street.

Council change the priority of the London Street / Barrack Street intersection so Barrack Street traffic has priority over London Street traffic. This significantly reduced the speed and volume of traffic travelling along London Street.

1.1.11 SAT discussion

The safety audit team note the following issues at St Mary's School

The school Bus Stop on Russell Street appears to be poorly located. It would be safer to have it in the recessed parking bay area on London Street next to the main school entrance.

Children cross Russell Street from the school gate next to the existing bus stop. When a stationary school bus is in this bus stop, it makes it very difficult for children to cross Russell Street because of restricted visibility blocking their line of sight to approaching drivers.

Parking on both sides of the streets around the school makes the road very narrow and restricts the ability of through traffic to move through these streets. It would be much safer if parking were limited to the school side of London, Russell and Tay Streets.

There is nothing to stop people parking along London Street opposite the school except for a short section of "NO STOPPING" road markings. These are located where foot traffic accesses the pedestrian rail crossing.

The pedestrian railway crossing does not line up with anything on London Street to enable wheelchair users or people pushing a child in a pushchair or pram to cross London Street, especially at the kerb crossings. That is, there are no pram crossings to enable these users to traverse the kerb and channels without having to mount a 125 mm vertical barrier currently hindering their progress.

The unofficial pedestrian crossing marked on Tay Street has no legal status and is confusing for drivers and pedestrians.

The pedestrian rail crossing and pram crossings connecting to the crossing place on London Street do not line up. In fact, the pram crossings do not have a pram crossing as such. Pedestrians have to step over the kerb and channel on both sides of London Street.

London Street is very narrow, especially when vehicles park along the shoulders. It was a rat run until closed off to through traffic at Halswell Street intersection some years ago. With the lack of space along London Street, Rob Condon asked if Council has considered making London Street One way. This would include remarking it with painted yellow dashed "NO STOPPING" lines so there is no parking along the railway side of the street.

If done, there would be space left between the traffic lane and the railway corridor to construct the proposed London Street shared pathway from Aramoho to Halswell Street. This will get past the pinch point between the substation and railway tracks on the other Seddon Street side of the railway.

London Street at Halswell Street could opened up to allow southbound traffic on London Street to turn left or right onto Halswell Street through a single exit lane.

If the section of London Street from Kaikokopu Road to Halswell Street becomes a single southbound, traffic lane and is successful, give consideration to making the section from Halswell Street to Victoria Avenue one lane too. It would be prudent to have a section of London Street (say between Halswell Street and Pitt Street) flow from south to north and the final section from Pitt Street to Victoria Avenue one lane heading south again. This will prevent London Street becoming a rat run.

1.1.12 SAT recommendations

The Safety Audit Team recommend Council consider the following actions:

Establish a formal Kea Crossing on London Street to line up with the crossing over the railway tracks. Include appropriate kerb extensions, poles and signs to bring the crossing up to the standard required for a fully functioning Kea Crossing.

Mark "NO STOPPING" lines each side of the crossing point to stop drivers parking too close to the crossing point where they block the sight lines to and from people using this place to cross London Street.

Set out a road counter that measures vehicle speeds on London Street mid-point between Barrack and Russell Streets to measure actual operating speeds on London Street. About 50 to 60% of whanau drive up Keith Street and park in Liverpool Street, or come along Liverpool from Aramoho at drop off and pick up times. The walk, scooter or bike to school. Liverpool Street appears to be used as a short cut from Aramoho to town. Speeding is a regular occurrence, as are burn-outs and donuts, often at the intersections of Keith and Liverpool and Liverpool and Pitt Street. Infact the speeding starts at Bell Street.

Our school has a high percentage of students with additional education needs. They are most at risk of failing to notice speeding traffic or of walking out onto the road without looking.

Papaiti Road is a very busy road. There is a lot of heavy vehicular traffic using it on a daily basis. There are many concealed driveways and those of us who live near the first bend have found exiting and entering driveways is much safer when vehicles are doing 60km/hr. It also means that we can wait on the road for cyclists to cross driveways without speeding drivers bearing down on us. Cyclists still use the road for cycling and we now have people on motorised scooters too using the road and the shared path. Dirt bikes use the shared path and often people park up on it which means that there are cyclists leaving the path and entering the road...often without looking or using any form of signal. We support the efforts Whanganui District Council (WDC) is making to create a safer local road network for all users. We support speed changes that promote safer roads and encourage the setting of speeds appropriate to the road environment and the highest-risk parts of the network are made safer.

Application of the agreed regional guiding principles for the setting of speeds as detailed below are encouraged:

Speed management is a key component of road safety and one of a number of aligned measures that can work towards the goal of everyone using our roads, can get to where they're going safely. We encourage the setting of speed limits aligned with a safe system approach to create a transport system where no one is killed or seriously injured in road crashes.



It is globally recognised small reductions in mean travel speeds results in large reductions of harm. Modest speed reductions have significant potential to reduce deaths and serious injuries resulting from crashes.

For every extra kilometre per hour of speed:

- The stopping distance increases
- The time to react and avoid a crash decreases
- The impact of a crash is more severe on the person
- There is more likelihood of serious injury or death

Strategic relevance

Horizons' Regional Land Transport Plan (RLTP) vision for Manawatū-Whanganui is – 'A region that connects central New Zealand and supports safe, accessible and sustainable transport options.

The RLTP has an objective of a transport network safe for all users and is supported by policy statements:

- Ensure continuous improvement in regional road safety based on a safe-system approach underpinned by:
 - o Designing for human vulnerability;
 - o Strengthening all parts of the road transport system;
 - Shared responsibility for road safety;
 - o Having actions that are grounded in evidence and evaluated appropriately;
 - o Road safety actions that support health, wellbeing and liveable places;
 - Making safety a critical decision-making priority;
- Ensure speeds are appropriate to the road environment and the highest-risk parts of the regional network are made safer.
- Support development and implementation of Speed Management Plans
- Prioritise investment to align with the National Road Safety Strategy

Monitoring

We encourage WDC as the road controlling authority to undertake monitoring and evaluation at a local level of the impacts of the speed changes.

Regular monitoring, evaluation and reporting are critical for keeping speed management plans on track to achieve local, regional and national outcomes. This informs the allocation of limited resources to achieve the most significant impacts.

Approach taken

We appreciate this first stage is centred on safer speeds around schools and locations around the district where informal speed limits are already in place. We encourage future stages to centre on known high risk crash areas using evidence from crash data, local knowledge and intelligence from Police.

We generally support the proposed speed limit changes for Whanganui district as outlined in the public consultation document. We do not expect any adverse impacts on public transport networks. Any increases in travel times are neglible.



Specific feedback on the speed management plan has been split into each area where changes are proposed.

School speed limits

We agree with the proposed introduction of speed zones for the schools identified and would like to see this well supported by clear cues for drivers to reduce speed as well as education and enforcement of changes. The application of infrastructure speed calming measures aligned with signage is supported where appropriate.

We advise alignment with State Highway speed plans and encourage close collaboration with NZTA Waka Kotahi to ensure changes proposed are aligned and consistent with adjoining highways to gain the greatest benefit for the safety of tamariki walking and cycling to school.

Any proposal to change speeds on local roads needs to be considered in conjunction with neighbouring state highways, otherwise there is a danger of shifting safety risks to other parts of the transport network. This is true of any change to speed limits on other parts of the network also.

As the Transport Minister recently announced - "The new Rule will implement variable speed limits on roads approaching schools during pick up and drop off times, rather than permanent reductions, to keep young New Zealanders safe when they are arriving at or leaving school."

The Minister advised in December 2023 - "I am writing to Road Controlling Authorities throughout the country to notify them of the changes and to advise them that work has begun on the new Rule. This allows them to stop work on current speed management plans until the Rule is put in place."

We offer caution that any school zone speed changes made by council to permanent speed signs, complies with the soon to be announced new rule by the Minister of Transport. This ensures changes meet new requirements and will not have to be revisited, incur additional costs and undermine community support.

We would like the following points raised below by officers, to be considered regarding individual school sites:

- Churton School will only have a lowered speed limit on Burmah Street, which is a cul-de-sac. Students also use the back gate which exits onto Somme Parade. It is a long stretch of road and passes a marae. Maybe consideration could be taken into lowering the speed along there too. Staff at Churton School confirmed Somme Parade is in more need of a speed restriction than Burmah Street. The main reason children cross the road on Somme Parade is because parents park on the opposite side of the school as there is insufficient room on the school side.
- <u>Carlton School</u> has a lot of students using Smithfield Road, which is from a back gate
 of the school. It isn't written on Table A of the proposed changes for school but it is
 highlighted on the maps as having a speed reduction of 30kmh.
- Rutherford Intermediate there may be merit and less confusion for road users on Toi Street, if the 30kmh continued around the corner to meet up with the 30kmh limit on Totara Street, past Tawhero and St Marcellin Schools.



Unofficial and inappropriate speed limits

Prioritising reducing speeds on roads where speeds are no longer fit for purpose is very important.

'Matching the road and life around it'. We support setting safe and appropriate speeds in accordance with land use (both present and future), types of road users present, street categories, design and infrastructure.

In summary

We support Whanganui District Council addressing speed concerns on local roads and encourage decisions to be based on evidence and local knowledge to support the best safety outcomes for all road users.

We would like to see further reductions in speed limits in the highest risk areas to deliver a safer transport network, encourage multi-modal travel and more liveable areas in our urban settings.

While this submission addresses speed changes outlined in the consultation document: we want to reiterate road safety is grounded in a safe system approach and reinforce the changes proposed are just one tool in addressing safety concerns.

Brake supports the proposed lowering of speed limits to reduce road deaths and injuries on these roads in the Whanganui district. As an organisation that supports people affected by road crashes, we see the devastating impact that they have on families, and the far-reaching effect they have on communities.

There is significant data and evidence to show that reducing traffic speeds is an effective way of reducing traffic related deaths and injuries. The risk of crashing, and of being killed or seriously injured in a crash increase exponentially to an increase in speed. The faster vehicles travel, the more frequent and severe road crashes become. [International Traffic Data and Analysis Group. "Speed and Crash Risk: Research report". Paris: International Transport Forum, 2018.]

Speed is an important factor in determining the outcome of a crash. People make mistakes so it's vital that our road system helps to minimise the consequences of those mistakes. By reducing speeds, we can reduce the severity of crashes, saving lives and reducing the number of families who suffer the tragedy of losing a loved one on the road. This includes implementing 30km/h limits around schools and in town centres, creating 30km/h zones for residential areas, reducing speeds on much of our rural road network, and ensuring there are safe and appropriate speeds in other places like parks, marae, holiday parks, and retirement villages.

There are examples from cities all over the world who are implementing 30km/h limits (or 20mph limits) to save lives and make more liveable communities. In these cities, lower speed limits are helping to reduce deaths and serious injuries, encourage more people to walk, cycle and use public transport and improve traffic flow.

The World Health Organisation (WHO) has emphasised the need for 30km/h limits, stating that in areas where 'motorised traffic mixes with pedestrians, cyclists, and moped riders, the speed limit must be under 30km/h' due to the vulnerability of these road users. [Global Status Report on Road Safety 2015, WHO, 2015]

Road safety is both a transport and public health issue. In addition to deaths and injuries in crashes, traffic also has an impact through air and noise pollution, and people's level of physical activity.

Our streets need to be safe for everyone, regardless of their mode of transport, age or socio-economic area. Children, pedestrians, and cyclists are disproportionately represented in road death and injury statistics.

Lower speeds also result in a decrease in fuel use and fewer emissions and pollutants, resulting in cleaner, greener and more liveable communities. Furthermore, in urban areas, increases in travel time due to lower speed limits are negligible. Research has found that children cannot judge the speed of approaching vehicles travelling faster than 30km/h, so may believe it is safe to cross when it is not. Subject: Proposal for Reduced Speed Limits and Safer School Crossing on Mosston Road outside Mosston School

Dear Submission Committee,

We are writing to you today on behalf of the staff and students at Mosston School to express our deep concern regarding the safety of staff and tamariki when crossing Mosston Road before and after school. The current speed limit of 60 km/h, even with the reduction to 40 km/h during school pick-up and drop-off times (with timed speed control signs), is simply not safe for the large number of young tamariki (aged 8-11) who need to cross this busy two-way road both before and after school. Unfortunately, many drivers disregard the posted speed limit or choose to stop completely on just the one side, creating a highly stressful situation for us (teachers) who supervise these crossings. We have noticed trucking firms often disregard the posted speed limit.

We are particularly concerned about the following issues:

- Limited breaks in traffic: Teachers frequently have to wait for significant gaps in traffic to safely cross even small groups of tamariki, most of whom are on bicycles or scooters. This significantly extends the crossing time and increases the risk of accidents. Additionally by ten past three the traffic from Westmere School and Faith School increases the traffic volume. On occasion, a child will trip over their bike and fall on the road. It is by good luck and vigilance by our teachers that an accident has not already occurred.
- Large number of tamariki: We have a roll of up to 170 tamariki depending on the time of the year. We recommend to families that their children should not travel to school unsupervised until they are 8 years old, but often younger tamariki accompany their older siblings. Up to 15 tamariki need to cross the road after school, making it difficult to manage them all safely at once.
- **Poor visibility:** The road is winding with poor visibility and limited reaction time, particularly from the Castlecliff end.
- **Speed Signs:** We are lucky to have remotely controlled speed reduction signs in place. These may only be operated between 8:25 am 9:00 am, and 2:45 pm-3:15 pm daily. We can also set them to operate for 10 minutes at a time, but only when 50 children are crossing. We agreed to this in 2008 and I have included the agreement for your information. There are occasions when school finishes early for the like of parent teacher interviews or we may close due to a teacher only day. The timetable for the signs is set at the beginning of the year, but some school closure/timetabling dates cannot be set until later in the year, so we must ask the council contractor (Strong Electrical) to make changes. We are billed for those subsequent changes. We have asked that our office

- manager be to make these changes, but we understand the technology supplier does not permit this. We understand that the Council fund these signs so maybe could have some influence here.
- Morning crossing: Our tamariki cross themselves in the morning as they are arriving at intervals between 8am and 9am. The speed signs do not come on until 8:25 am, but many tamariki cross before this as parents have gone to work so send their children to school.
- Legal aspects: Apart from the trauma of witnessing a child/vehicle collision by the teacher managing the after school crossing, we do not know what the legal ramifications would be on the supervising teacher, especially considering the likely illegal traffic behaviour.

To improve the safety of our students, we propose the following solutions:

- Reduce the permanent speed limit on Mosston Road to 50 km/h.
- Implement a 30 km/h speed limit during designated peak times (e.g. before and after school).
- Ideally, establish a designated school crossing both before and after school with a legally enforceable school road crossing to allow for safe crossing of our tamariki and their whānau.
- Increase operating times for the speed control signs in the morning from 8:15am

With the significant development planned for the area, we anticipate both housing and traffic volumes to increase dramatically in the coming years. This, as well as heavy traffic using Mosston Road as a bypass to go to the Industrial areas of Heads Road and Mill Road causes concern. Addressing these safety concerns now will be crucial in preventing future accidents.

While we promote an active lifestyle for our Springvale school community, however we understand their anxiety around the challenges their children face getting themselves to school. The footpath situation has improved greatly in recent times, but crossing the road cannot be avoided and all crossing areas are risky in our area with multiple intersections and poor visibility. We think the existing crossing area is the best location for a controlled crossing.

We urge you to consider our proposal and prioritise the safety of our tamariki. We are willing to work with the council to explore additional safety measures like signage, road markings, or even speed bumps (if applicable) to enhance the effectiveness of the proposed speed limit reduction and to provide any additional information you may require.

Thank you for your time and attention to this important safety matter.

The School Zone must be operated in accordance with the following rules set out by the Wanganui District Council. Failure to comply with the rules may result in the removal of the Speed Zone.

- 1. The 'School Zone variable' signs must be activated by a person authorised by the school Principal.
- 2. Any defined school crossing facility for children must have an adult supervisor when it is operating.
- 3. The 'School Zone variable' may only be activated:
 - On school days between 8.25am 9.00am;
 - On school days between 2.45pm 3.15pm;
 - 10 minutes at any other time of day when at least 50 children cross the road or enter or leave vehicles at the roadside.
- 4. The school will notify the council immediately of any problems or failures of the School Zone equipment.
- 5. The school will notify the council immediately if the School Zone is no longer required.

I was the previous Principal of Mosston School which is placed on a dangerous bend in Mosston road. Mosston Road is an arterial road which carries large trucks and quite a bit of traffic to the Castlecliff area. Initially it had a speed limit of 70km but we were able to install speed restrictions to 40kmphr around key student drop off and pick up times thanks to previous Council members. The overall speed limit has been reduced to 60 km phr since.

The District Council has also recently upgraded the footpaths access to the school from Buxton Road to encourage more students to walk and ride to school. Also the footpaths are being upgraded from the Springvale end. It is a pity it comes up on the side which is blind at the Montgomery Road intersection to those crossign to attend school or walking by. And unfortunately the school is still on the dangerous bend and students are only allowed approx. 10 seconds to cross to the school side before traffic comes around the bend. Outside school hours the restriction is lifted and the speed remains 60 kmphr. Heavy traffic going by creates significant disruption to children's learning.

Reducing the speed limit to 30km phr would would significantly improve safety for students crossing the road before and after school.

The ultimate solution would be to place a roundabout at the Montgomery Road intersection and bring Tayforth Road over to join into the roundabout. The spare land is there to carry out this process.

However there is still a concern that the time it takes students to cross the road from Buxton road side, which is the road students not being dropped off and picked up by car, allows approx. 10 Seconds to carry out the maneuvre. Currently the normal road speed is 60km per hour past the school except between 8.30 - 9.30am and 2 30 - 3.30pm where the school has been able to install special lights "asking" traffic to slow to 40km per hour for about 25 meters each side of the school. If a Council Bylaw was established to drop this to 30km per hour perhaps this would further enhance the safety of the school's students and encourage more to walk or bike to school. 

Further to the proposed changes to the speed limits on feeder roads to Airport Road – namely Landguard Road and the feeder road to the Pound and Waste Water Treatment plant, we would like to propose further rationalisation of the speed limits along Wikitoria and Airport Roads. These proposed changes would complement the proposed introduction of 30km/h speed zones to the aforementioned feeder roads


We would like to suggest reducing the speed limit at the 50km/h to 100km/h transition at RP660m on Wikitoria Road to a new speed limit of 60km/h. This new 60km/h speed limit would run through to RP1.53km that will transition in to the newly proposed 30km/h zone.

Our reasons for the proposed amendment are as follows:

- Travelling west along Wikitoria Road the speed limit returns to a 100km/h zone just before Onetere Drive and the intersections of Landguard Road and Airport Road.
- This means the effective speed limit in Onetere Drive is 100km/h and that traffic speeds up just before encountering these intersections.
- This section of road also hosts PERTH Concrete and the associated heavy truck movements across the road just before the rise.
- Further truck movements are also encountered mid-way up the hill at 1c Airport Road with Bullocks trucks entering and exiting the forestry land.
- We also note that there is a planned 18 lot rural subdivision at 1c Airport which would further intensify traffic along the beginning of Airport Road.
- Airport Road and Wikitoria roads also hosts heavy traffic during Oceanview Speedway and Whanganui Motocross Track events.
 (During these events one-way systems are often put in place to improve traffic safety).
- The transition of the present 100km/h to 60km/h will facilitate better transition into the proposed 30km zones along Airport Road, Landguard Road and the side road into the Waste Water Treatment Plant and Pound.

Slowing traffic doesn't make it easier for people to get around the district - slower speed limits lead to increased travel time when travelling from rural areas and outer city limits to the central city or across town. There are areas of Whanganui that would benefit from higher limits to make travel more efficient.

As a health professional working in our local surgical services (public & private operating theatre / air ambulance) there have been very few people injured due to colliding with vehicles travelling at the present speed limits. Injuries are most unlikely to change with a reduction in speed limits and there are usually other causal factors in injury accidents eg cyclists not wearing helmets, cyclists/mobility scooter/scooter riders not observing traffic or indicating before manoeuvring, driver fatigue/mental state, effect of drugs (legitimate and illegal), alcohol, vehicle condition, speed inappropriate for conditions, poor road surface.

Speed reduction alone is not a panacea for harm reduction in general road situations.

The road is in better condition now than prior to it's 2020 rebuild when it was a safe 100 Km/h road.

I believe if a road has a section or area that requires reduced speed then advisory signage should be used rather than continuous speed limit changes. This is successfully employed on most New Zealand roads e.g. Paraparas where sharp corners don't have speed limit signs!Further, speed limits are more likely to be ignored by motorists than advisory signs.

In 2020 my local road, Papaiti Road, was improved, being widened, graded, & completely resurfaced, along with cycle and pedestrian traffic being separated onto a council designed, designated pathway. A traffic crash barrier was installed for the length of the sharp bend on the end of the first straight, approximately 1km past the cemetery.

After this, what had been a safe, 100 Km/h road before these upgrades, now had a speed limit reduction to 60 Km/h following lobbying by residents in this area. The road approximately 1.3km from the cemetery gained a reduction to 80 Km/h. Observation indicates that almost all properties along Papaiti Road are physically well back from the road margins, and there has not been an accident solely caused by speed in this area. It is appropriate that the entire road be returned to 100 Km/h given the extended distance many residents in the Papaiti area travel to do business in the urban area.
